Existing Facilities

Existing Facility

- 14,000 sq. ft. facility.
- Located at Alessandro/Kitching
 - 25480 Alessandro Blvd
- Built in 1987
 - 28 years old

General Statistics (FY 2014/15)

- Number of Visitors 325,164
- Hours of Operation 3,370
- Reference Questions 45,865
- Number of Materials Checked Out by Library Patrons 330,809

Computer Usage (FY 2014/15)

- Increased the number of public computers from 24 to 38 in August 2014
- 15 Minute Sessions 6,217 sessions
- 30 Minute Sessions 4,407 sessions
- 1 Hour Sessions 37,140 sessions
- Children's Sessions 9,742 sessions



Existing Services

Programs (FY 2014/15)

- Adult Programs 155; 1,993 attendees
- Bilingual Storytime 46 events; 1,582 attendees
- Family Programs 47 events; 1,026 attendees
- Group Visits to Library 23 groups; 974 attendees
- Preschool Storytimes 64 events; 2,746 attendees
- Reading Program Signups 1,857 participants
- Teen Programs 51 events; 581 attendees

Volunteerism (FY 2014/15)

- Number of Volunteers 452 volunteers
- Volunteer Hours 5,446 volunteer service hours



Current Operations

- Funded through property taxes (ad-valorem)
- Library operations and services contracted through LSSI
- \$1.75M Annual Operating Budget (FY 2015/16)
 - \$8.70 per capita spending
 - National average \$37.97 per capita (per LSSI)
 - Note: spending per capita may also vary based on operational efficiencies

Methods to Expand Services (Prior Plan)

FY 2007/08 Library development plan

- New main library facility located at Civic Center site
- 70,000 square feet
 - Phase I 38,777 sq ft, \$22 million construction
 - Phase II 31,223 sq ft, costs TBD
- No funding in place for library operations
 - Est. \$2.5 annual operating costs



Alternatives to Expand Services

Construct new main library

- Land and building
 - Fund construction with TUMF reimbursement (\$11M over 11 years)
 - How to fund operating costs?
 - Size and location?

Rent new location (one or multiple?)

- Estimated 5,000-7,000 sq. ft. store front facility (half size of current library)
 - Start-up costs \$700,000
 - Annual operations \$500,000
 - Facility lease must be negotiated
 - Est. of \$20 sq. ft./year would total \$100,000 \$140,000 annually



- Special Parcel Tax (Requires 2/3rds voter approval)
- Community Facilities District (Requires 2/3rds voter approval)
- Partnership with school/college district
 - Joint use facility
- Public private partnership
 - Through mixed use development of City land



Financing Alternatives

Zone L parcel tax previously proposed to voters in 2001

- 9.5% voted, 43% voted "Yes"
- Required 2/3 approval of registered voters
- Additional \$20 per parcel

City currently has approx. 48,000 parcels

- Each \$1 charge per parcel would raise \$48,000 annually
- A \$15 parcel charge = \$720,000. Could fund store front location
- Examine different charges per residential/non-residential uses



Financing Alternatives

Parcel tax process (6-24 months)

- Initiate planning efforts
- Implement public opinion research and analysis
- Encourage non-partisan community outreach
 - City may not support or oppose
 - Only provide information
 - Independent library group may conduct outreach
- Election

Requires two thirds (66%) approval of received ballots by registered voters

- City has 76,085 registered voters
- Historical elections have approx. 20% voter participation
 - Need approx. 10,200 votes for approval (2/3rds approval)
