- Adopt Resolution No. 2016-77, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, authorizing the acceptance of the Public Improvements as complete within Project PA11-0007 (Parcel Map 35879) and acceptance of those portions of Heacock Street, Iris Avenue, Krameria Avenue, and Cosmos Street associated with this Project into the City's Maintained Street System.
- 2. Authorize the City Engineer to execute a 90% reduction to the Faithful Performance Bond, exonerate the Material and Labor Bond in 90 days if there are no stop notices or liens on file with the City Clerk, and exonerate the final 10% of the Faithful Performance Bond in one year when all clearances are received.

SUMMARY

This report recommends acceptance of the improvements associated with PA11-0007 (PM 35879) into the City's maintained street system. The project is located on the southeast corner of Heacock Street and Iris Avenue. This report also recommends

authorizing the City Engineer to execute a 90% security reduction to the Faithful Performance Bond, exonerate the Material and Labor Bond in 90 days if there are no stop notices or liens on file with the City Clerk, and exonerate the final 10% warranty portion of the Faithful Performance Bond in one year, subject to completion of any defective work during this period.

DISCUSSION

On January 22, 2013, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley approved Tentative Parcel Map 35879 (PA11-0007) and Conditions of Approval. The developer proposed to subdivide 75.05-gross acres of Assessor's Parcel Number 316-020-032/033/034/035/036 into four parcels in the Industrial zone.

The project is located at the southeast corner of Heacock Street and Iris Avenue and was conditionally approved requiring construction of certain public improvements. Improvements were constructed along the project's frontage of Heacock Street, Iris Avenue, Krameria Avenue, and Cosmos Street. The public improvements included asphalt, base, curb, gutter, sidewalk, storm drain, sewer and water, driveway approaches, street lights, striping, signage, and traffic signals and signal modifications. Those improvements received on-going inspection during the construction process. Upon completion of the improvements, Public Works Department/Land Development performed an inspection, and a punch list was generated. The required corrective actions have been completed, and the improvements are now eligible for acceptance into the City's maintained street system.

In accordance with the Streets and Highway Code, the method for acceptance of improvements, per Section 1806 (a) and (b), is by action of the governing body ("City Council"), by resolution. It is therefore appropriate to accept those improvements into the City's maintained street system and to provide a 90% reduction to the Faithful Performance Bond of \$5,463,000 issued by Travelers Casualty and Surety Company of America. Ninety days after City Council approves the Faithful Performance Bond reduction, the Material and Labor security will be exonerated by the City Engineer provided there are no stop notices or liens on file with the City Clerk. The remaining 10% of the security will be held for the one-year guarantee and warranty period. At the end of the guarantee and warranty period the security will be released by the City Engineer subject to completion of any defective work that may have appeared during this period.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative because this alternative will allow the City to be in compliance with the Streets and Highways Code Section 1806 (a) and (b) in becoming a public street or road. Accepting the subject street improvements into the city street system results in City maintenance as public streets.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this Staff Report. Staff does not recommend this alternative because this alternative

will not allow the streets, per the Streets and Highways Code Section 1806 (a) and (b), to become a street or road for public use, and the City would not be able to maintain the streets and roads as public infrastructure to meet City Council's Goals.

FISCAL IMPACT

The acceptance of these street improvements into the City's maintained street system will create an additional fiscal impact to the street maintenance program of the City Fund 2000-Gas Tax, Fund 2001-Measure A, and Fund 2007-Storm Water Maintenance. Fund 2000 is restricted to the construction and maintenance of streets and roadways. Fund 2001 is restricted for transportation projects only for the purposes of construction, maintenance and operation of streets and roadways. Street maintenance costs over a 20 year period are estimated to average almost \$12,000 per 13 foot wide lane mile per year. Based on the current street section being accepted of 2.5 lane miles, the estimated annual cost is \$30,000.

The street section includes 33 additional street lights with an estimated annual operating cost of \$250 each. The parcels associated with this project are part of Community Services District (CSD) Zone C and pay \$9.00 per parcel on its annual property tax bill. This project was entitled and construction began prior to the formation of Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services). As a result, the street lights are funded through CSD Zone C. The General Fund currently offsets the revenue necessary to fund the operations of CSD Zone C.

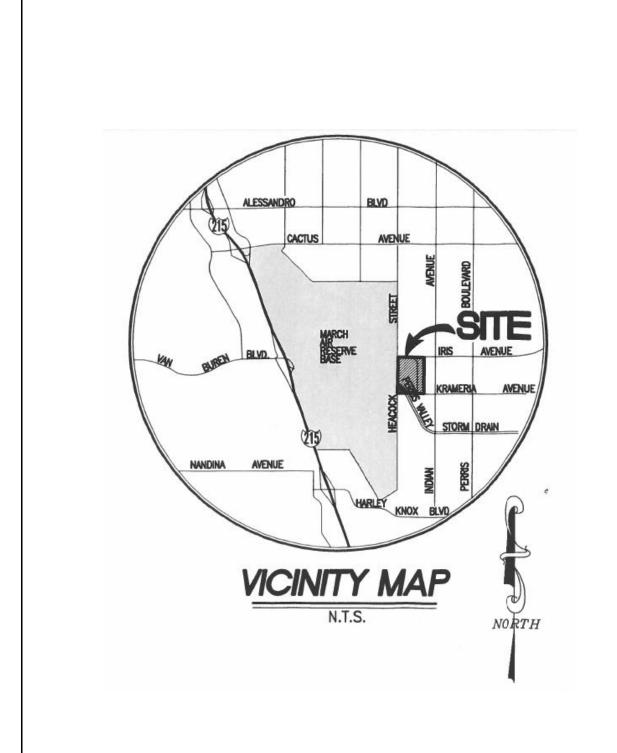

SUMMARY

The attached Quarterly Investment Report presents the City's cash and investments for the quarter that ended September 30, 2016. This report is in compliance with California Government Code Section 53646 regarding the reporting of detailed information on all securities, investments, and monies of the City, as well as the reporting of the market value of the investments held. All of the investments contained within the portfolio are in full compliance with the City's Investment Policy and Government Code Section 53601 as to the types of investments allowed. It is recommended that the City Council receive and file the attached Quarterly Investment Report.

DISCUSSION

The City maintains a portfolio of investments in order to earn interest on cash balances that are not currently required to fund operations. California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53646 establish the types of investments allowed, the governing restrictions on these investments, the third-party custodian arrangement for certain investments, and the reporting practices related to the portfolios of local agencies. The City has implemented an Investment Policy which was revised and adopted on June 7, 2016 and is in full compliance with the requirements of both of the above-mentioned Code Sections.

The attached Quarterly Investment Report presents the City's cash and investments for the quarter that ended September 30, 2016. The report complies with California Government Code Section 53646 regarding the reporting of detailed information on all securities, investments, and monies of the City, as well as the reporting of the market value of the investments held. All of the investments contained within the portfolio are in full compliance with the City's Investment Policy and Government Code Section 53601 as to the types of investments allowed. As stated in the attached report, there is more than adequate liquidity within the portfolio for the City to meet its budgeted expenditures over the next six months.

The City's investment policy has set the primary goals of the portfolio management as Safety and Liquidity followed by Yield. The City currently utilizes two investment management firms who use an active investment management approach in which securities are purchased but not necessarily held to maturity, and may be actively traded based on market conditions and the City's investment goals. The City's cash flow requirements are evaluated on an ongoing basis, with short-term needs accommodated through the City's pooled investment funds with the State Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). LAIF is a pool of public funds managed by the State Treasurer of California, providing 24-hour liquidity while yielding a rate of return approximately equivalent to a one-year treasury bill. With the combined use of a conservative approach to evaluating cash flow needs and LAIF liquidity, the City will not have to liquidate securities at current market rates that are intended to be held for longer-term investment.

The table shows some of the key portfolio measure for the month.

Bond proceeds are held and invested by a Trustee. The investment of these funds is governed by an investment policy approved by the City Council as a part of the governing documents for each specific bond issue. Deferred Compensation Plan funds are included in the report but these funds are held and invested by the respective plan administrators based on the direction of the participating employees. These funds are placed in a trust separate from City funds.

- 2. Do not accept and file the Quarterly Investment Report and provide staff with additional direction. **Staff does not recommend this alternative as it will not**

FISCAL IMPACT

The Treasury yield curve showed very little change in September however; early indicators in October show yields moving up with the anticipation that the Fed rate will be increased at their December meeting. This volatility directly impacts the ability of the portfolio to generate interest income and a rise in interest rates should eventually result in additional income to the portfolio. The budget anticipated investment income for the General Fund of \$2 million. Through September investment income has totaled \$441,000.

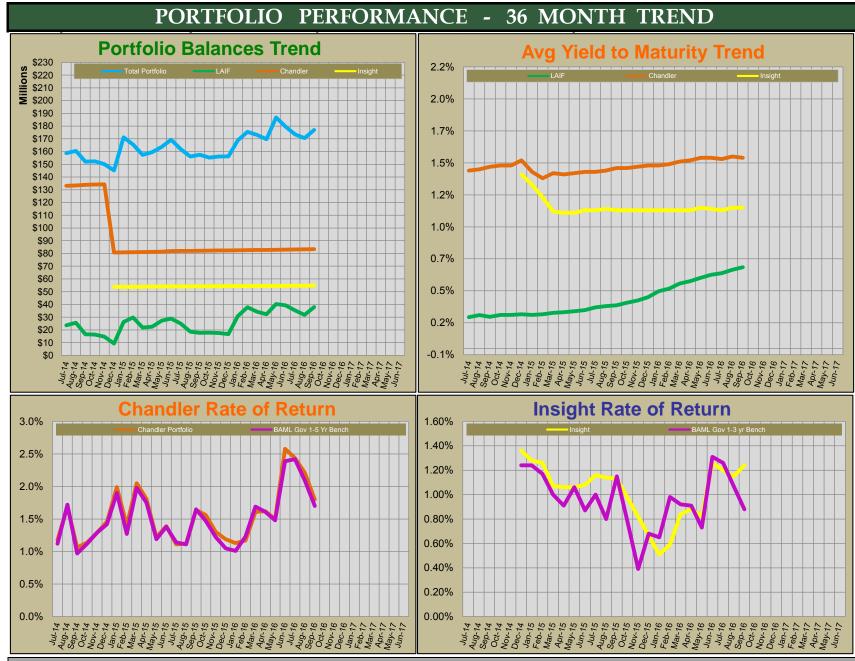

The portfolio invested in LAIF represents the City's immediate cash liquidity needs and is managed by City staff in a manner to fund the day to day operations of the City.

The portfolio managed by Insight is comprised of idle cash balances related to funds that generally expect to expend cash within the next 36 months. (Example: Gen Fund, Zone A, Measure A, NSP etc.)

The portfolio managed by Chandler is comprise of idle cash balances related to funds that generally expect to expend cash with the next 24 to 60 months. (Example: Facility & Equip Replacement, Endowments etc.)

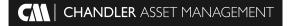

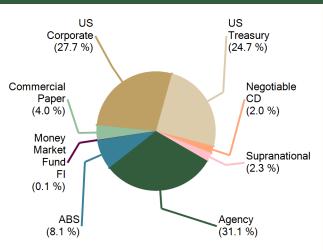

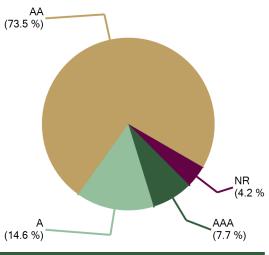
SECTOR ALLOCATION

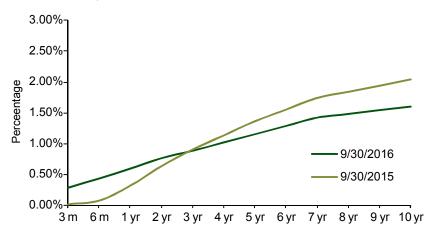

Economic Indicators & Monetary Policy

Durable goods orders for the month of August were flat after a 4.4% jump in July. Analysts had expected a drop of 1.5% so the flat number was better than the surveys had predicted. There was also good news from the pick-up in durable goods capital equipment orders for the last three months, which may foreshadow a positive economic contribution from this sector in the latter half of this year.

Institute for Supply Management (ISM) survey for the manufacturing sector rebounded significantly in the month of September. The results topped expectations with the index moving from 49.4 in August to 51.5 for September. Any number over 50 represents an expansion of the economic activity within that sector.

The third and final revision for the second quarter GDP showed an economy that was stronger than previously reported. The most recent numbers showed the economy expanded at a 1.4% rate in the second quarter up from the 1.1% rate that was previously reported. This revision beats analysts' expectations. Consumer spending, the most important component of economic growth, remained nearly unchanged. However, exports and non-residential construction were both revised upward for a positive contribution to the overall improvement.

Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) the Federal Reserve's preferred measure of inflation was up 0.1% for September. The small increase shows that inflation remains very modest. Analysts had expected the September number to increase 0.2% as the August number had remained unchanged.

Yield Curve & Spreads

At the end of September, the 3-month US Treasury bill yielded 0.28%, the 6-month US Treasury bill yielded 0.43%, the 2-year US Treasury note yielded 0.76%, the 5-year US Treasury note yielded 1.15%, and the 10-year US Treasury note yielded 1.60% (see Chart 2).

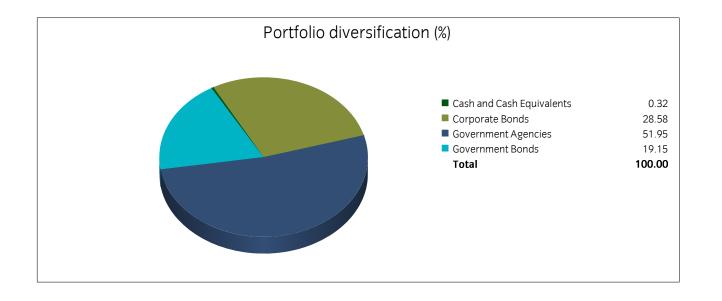

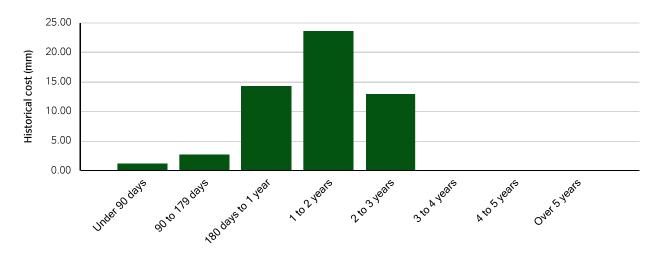

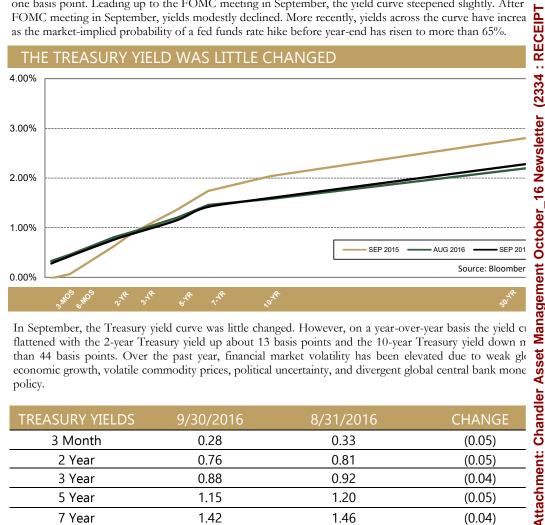
Market Summary

The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) kept the fed funds rate unchanged at a range of 0.25%-0.5 in September. However, there were three dissenting votes (out of ten), as Esther George (Kansas Ci Loretta Mester (Cleveland), and Eric Rosengren (Boston) preferred to raise the target range by a qua percent. The Fed's overall assessment of the economy was little changed from July. In the policy statem 🗠 the Committee noted the labor market has continued to strengthen but inflation remains below target. deciding whether or not to raise the fed funds target rate, the Committee said "the case for an increase in federal funds rate has strengthened but decided, for the time being, to wait for further evidence of contin progress toward its objectives." In her press conference, Fed Chair Yellen remarked that the next meeting November 1-2 is a "live" meeting but given its proximity to the US Presidential election on November 8, think the Fed is likely to keep monetary policy on hold until December. If economic data remains mode favorable over the next few months, we expect the Fed will hike the fed funds rate range by 25 basis po in December.

Market participants estimate the economy grew at an annualized pace of about 2.9% in the third quarter accurate, that represents a pick-up from first and second quarter GDP growth of 0.8% and 1.4 respectively. The consensus forecast calls for GDP growth of about 2.5% in the fourth quarter. Labor man trends remain favorable, which should continue to provide a tailwind to economic growth. unemployment rate was 5.0% in September, wage growth ticked higher, and payrolls increased by 156, (more than enough to absorb new entrants into the labor market). Consumer confidence is strong. Hous trends remain positive even though home price appreciation has softened. Oil prices have rebounded fr earlier this year. The manufacturing sector, though still under pressure, has slightly improved. Over domestic economic data remains indicative of slow growth.

In September, the 2-year Treasury yield decreased four basis points and the 10-year Treasury yield increa one basis point. Leading up to the FOMC meeting in September, the yield curve steepened slightly. After FOMC meeting in September, yields modestly declined. More recently, yields across the curve have increa as the market-implied probability of a fed funds rate hike before year-end has risen to more than 65%.

THE TREASURY YIELD WAS LITTLE CHANGED



In September, the Treasury yield curve was little changed. However, on a year-over-year basis the yield cu flattened with the 2-year Treasury yield up about 13 basis points and the 10-year Treasury yield down n than 44 basis points. Over the past year, financial market volatility has been elevated due to weak glo economic growth, volatile commodity prices, political uncertainty, and divergent global central bank mone policy.

Economic Roundup

Consumer Prices

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) was up 1.1% year-over-year in August, versus up 0.8% year-over-year in July. Core CPI (CPI less food and energy was up 2.3% year-over-year in August, vs. 2.2% in July. The Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) index was up 1.0% year-over-year in August, versus 0.8% in July. Core PCE (excluding food and energy) was up 1.7% year-over-year in August vs. up 1.6% year-over-year in July Although Core CPI is trending above 2.0%, the Fed's primary inflation gauge is PCE which remains below the Fed's 2.0% target.

Retail Sales

On a year-over-year basis, total retail sales were up 1.9% in August, compared with a 2.4% increase in July. On a month-over-month basis, reta sales declined 0.3% in August, below expectations. Excluding autos, retail sales fell 0.1% in the month.

Lahor Market

Nonfarm payrolls were lower than expected in September, up 156,000 versus the consensus forecast of 172,000. July and August payrolls wer revised down by a net total of 7,000. On a trailing 3-month and 6-month basis, payrolls increased by an average of 192,000 and 169,000 per montl respectively. The unemployment rate inched up in September to 5.0% from 4.9% in August, as the participation rate increased to 62.9% from 62.8%. A broader measure of unemployment called the U-6, which includes those who are marginally attached to the labor force and employed patime for economic reasons, remained unchanged in September at 9.7%. Wages increased 0.2% in September, following a 0.1% increase in Augus On a year-over-year basis, wages were up 2.6% in September, versus 2.4% in August.

Housing Starts

Total housing starts fell 5.8% in August, following growth of 1.4% in July. Single-family starts fell 6.0% in August while multi-family starts decline 5.4%. Housing starts tend to be volatile on a month-to-month basis but the underlying trend remains favorable. Notably, single-family perm growth was strong in August.

FIXED INCOME MARKET REVIEW

ECONOMIC INDICATORS AND MONETARY POLICY

Durable goods orders for the month of August were flat after a 4.4% jump in July. Analysts had expected a drop of 1.5% so the flat number was better than the surveys had predicted. There was also good news from the pick-up in durable goods capital equipment orders for the last three months, which may foreshadow a positive economic contribution from this sector in the latter half of this year.

Institute for Supply Management (ISM) survey for the manufacturing sector rebounded significantly in the month of September. The results topped expectations with the index moving from 49.4 in August to 51.5 for September. Any number over 50 represents an expansion of the economic activity within that sector.

The third and final revision for the second quarter GDP showed an economy that was stronger than previously reported. The most recent numbers showed the economy expanded at a 1.4% rate in the second quarter up from the 1.1% rate that was previously reported. This revision beats analysts' expectations. Consumer spending, the most important component of economic growth, remained nearly unchanged. However, exports and non-residential construction were both revised upward for a positive contribution to the overall improvement.

Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) the Federal Reserve's preferred measure of inflation was up 0.1% for September.

The small increase shows that inflation remains very modest.

Analysts had expected the September number to increase 0.2% as the August number had remained unchanged.

At the end of September, the 3-month US Treasury bill yielded 0.28%, the 6-month US Treasury bill yielded 0.43%, the 2-year US Treasury note yielded 0.76%, the 5-year US Treasury note yielded 1.15%, and the 10-year US Treasury note yielded 1.60% (see Chart 2).

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

1. Receive and file the Annual Report on Development Impact Fees in compliance with California Government Code 66006.

2. Approve the finding that staff has demonstrated a continuing need to hold unexpended Development Impact Fees.

SUMMARY

Government Code Section 66006 requires cities that impose impact fees to render an annual accounting of the fees and to provide findings that support the retention of any fees that have been held in excess of five years and remain unexpended or have not been committed to projects. The City has no Development Impact Fees (DIF) that are unexpended and uncommitted for a period of five years or more. The information included in this staff report is provided to comply with State law.

DISCUSSION

Government Code Section 66006 requires cities imposing impact fees to undertake an annual accounting of such fees within 180 days of the fiscal year end. The Code also requires that the accounting be made available for public review. The accounting must provide the beginning and ending balances for the fiscal year, receipts, disbursements, interest earned and any other income. The report must include a description of how the fees were expended during the past year. If fees are unexpended, whether committed or uncommitted for a period of five or more years, the report must include a finding regarding the continuing need for the fees. If a continuing need cannot be shown, State

law requires that the City refund the unused, uncommitted fees. The City's report contains no such instances of unexpended and uncommitted Development Impact Fees.

The attached Annual Report on Development Impact Fees is for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016. This report is prepared in compliance with the California Government Code Section 66006 regarding the annual accounting of impact fees. The accounting was complete and the required information was available to the public within the required time frame, 180 days subsequent to fiscal year end. The report has been available for public review on file in the City Clerk's office for more than 15 days prior to being considered by the City Council, in accordance with state law.

On June 7, 2016 the City Council approved Resolution 2016-33 which amended short-term loans from the General Fund to address negative cash balances in the Police (\$4,085,000) and the Animal Shelter (\$137,000) DIF funds. The loan agreement calls for repayment by June 30, 2017 or, if the funds are not repaid, the issue is to be reconsidered by the City Council.

This report does not include any findings that require the return of unexpended or uncommitted DIF fees. This report does make a finding for continuing to hold previously collected development impact fees. All funds collected and held by the City as of June 30, 2016 within each of the 14 respective Development Impact Fee funds are designated for specific capital projects, consistent with the Development Impact Fee Study Final Report approved by the City Council on December 11, 2012, and the Capital Improvement Plan approved by the City Council on June 21, 2016.

Interest earnings attributable to the DIF funds totaled \$165,845 for the year.

The recommended action supports the Infrastructure priority included in the Momentum Moval Strategic Plan.

ALTERNATIVES

The following alternatives are available to the City Council:

- 1. Approve and accept the Annual Report on Development Impact Fees in compliance with California Government Code Section 66006 and approve the finding that staff has demonstrated a continuing need to hold unexpended Development Impact Fees. Staff recommends this alternative to comply with the reporting requirements of the California Government Code.
- 2. Approve and accept the Annual Report on Development Impact Fees in compliance with California Government Code Section 66006 but reject the finding that staff has demonstrated a continuing need to hold unexpended Development Impact Fees. Staff does not recommend this alternative in that this action could result in the need to refund unexpended fees such that projects and

debt service intended to be funded through these fees would be left without a funding source.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact resulting from the recommended action; the information included in the staff report is provided to comply with State law.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of the First Amendment for Professional Consultant Services with GHD for engineering design and construction support for the Cycle 6 ADA Pedestrian Ramp Improvements. The project is funded by the Community Development

Block Grant (CDBG) and has been approved in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

DISCUSSION

This project is for the design and construction of approximately thirty (30) access ramps at eight (8) locations throughout the City of Moreno Valley to be compliant with the ADA. These locations are within the City's CDBG target areas or at locations providing public transit accessibility to CDBG target areas. This project will enhance safety for pedestrians and is funded with CDBG funds. CDBG approved the project application on May 9, 2016.

The consultant's scope of work consists of three (3) phases. The first phase of the work is the planning/environmental, the second phase is the design (Plans, Specifications, and Estimate), and the third phase will be the construction support. Requests for Proposals (RFP) for professional consultant services were e-mailed to a list of professional consultants and it was posted on the City's bidding website. The City received three (3) proposals in response to the RFP. A Selection Committee, comprised of City staff, reviewed and rated all proposals, based on qualifications-based selection criteria. GHD was selected as the most qualified consultant for this project. The firm demonstrated a very thorough understanding of the work, had recently completed a very similar project, and demonstrated excellent technical ability in all critical areas. The firm proposed and committed qualified staff and sub consultants. City staff conducted contract negotiations with GHD and agreed with GHD's final fee proposal of \$82,498. The proposal included \$76,198 for the design phase and \$6,300 for the construction support phase. The proposal was accepted and the Agreement was executed and signed by the City Manager on March 8, 2016. At that time, the Agreement was within the City Manager's signature authority.

In August 2016, City staff requested a Proposal/Fee Estimate for additional work from GHD. The additional scope includes closing off an existing bus bay and reconstruction of the sidewalk to be ADA compliant on the east side of Perris Boulevard, north of JFK Avenue. The existing bus bay is not utilized by Riverside Transit Authority (RTA) and surrounding sidewalk is damaged by tree roots. The fee for the additional scope of work is \$6,200 in Phase 2. Because the City Manager's contract agreement signature authority is now \$75,000, City Council's approval is required.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will provide for the timely construction of the Cycle 6 ADA Pedestrian Ramp Improvements.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will delay the timely construction of the Cycle 6 ADA Pedestrian Ramp Improvements.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Cycle 6 ADA Pedestrian Ramp Improvements are funded by CDBG funds (Fund 2512) for design and construction phases and included in the FY 2016-2017 CIP. A more accurate construction cost estimate will be determined once the design phase is completed. There is no impact to the General Fund.

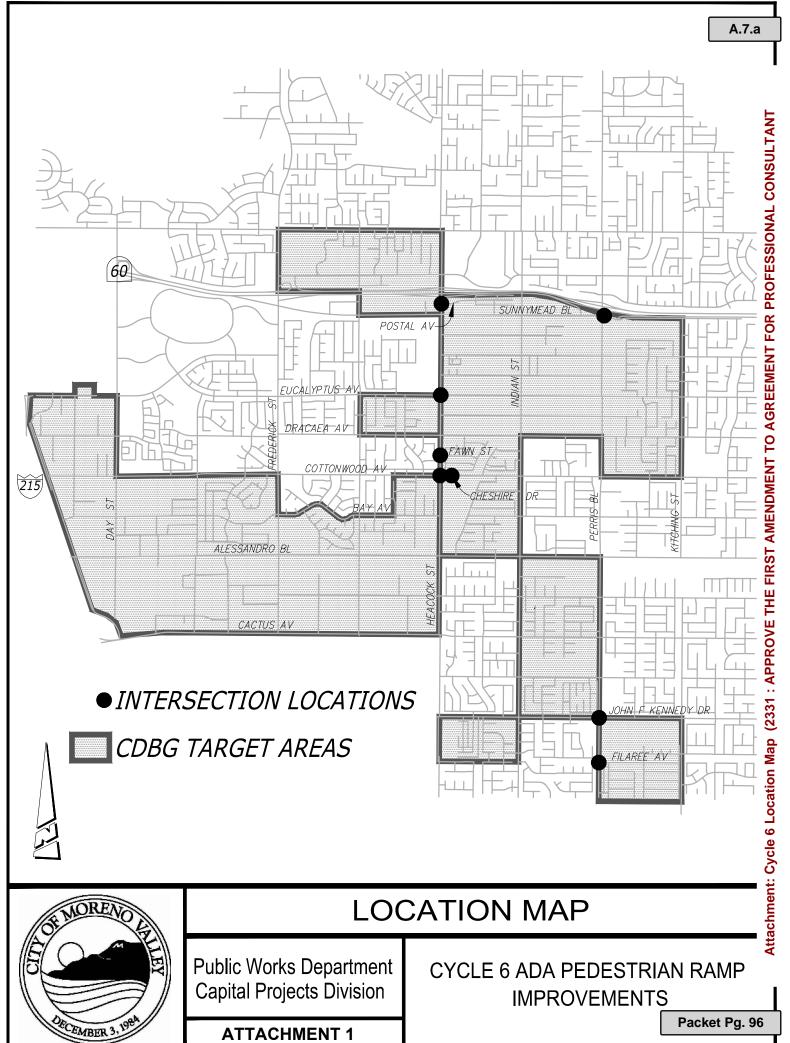

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval to purchase one replacement traffic striping truck for an existing 1997 Ford CF 8000 model, which is at the end of its useful life. This purchase is funded through Capital Equipment Replacement funds appropriated within the General Fund and was approved in the FY 2015/16 – 2016/17 Operating Budget by the City Council on June 23, 2015.

DISCUSSION

The unit to be replaced is one medium-capacity, traffic striping truck, Model 1997 Ford CF 8000. This vehicle has exceeded its normal life cycle and is critical to traffic maintenance operations. This vehicle is in poor mechanical condition and requires expensive repairs due to years of heavy use. Replacement for this vehicle is imperative to maintain traffic striping services. City Council approved an appropriation of \$2,482,909 on June 23, 2015 for fleet replacement from account 1010-70-78-45370-

660322. The City's fleet will remain at its current level; the one striping truck being replaced will be retired and processed as surplus.

A Request for Proposal (RFP# 2017-010) was issued on August 3, 2016 and posted on PlanetBids, bid management software subscribed to by the City. The City notified forty-six (46) vendors to spur an interest in the bidding process. Three (3) RFP's were received through PlanetBids at the close of the bid process on August 24, 2016.

The vendor proposals received and reviewed are as follows:

Fritts Ford \$210,429.56 M-B Companies, Inc \$287,710.28

Trinity Diversified Inc Non-Responsive Bid (\$154,339.19 body only,

cab and chassis not included in price)

The award of the contract is based on the lowest responsive and responsible Proposer that best meets the City's specifications and needs, and represents the best overall value for the City.

Fritts Ford has been determined to be the lowest, responsive and responsible Proposer that best meets the City's specifications and needs. The bid received from Trinity Diversified Inc was determined to be a non-responsive bid as the bid only included the bed and equipment; vehicle (cab and chassis) was not included in the bid.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Award to Fritts Ford, Riverside, CA, for the purchase of one 2017 Ford F-750 chassis truck with traffic striping body; and authorize the Purchasing & Facilities Division Manager to issue a purchase order to Fritts Ford in the amount of \$210,429.56. (Staff recommends this action as it is consistent with the best practice of replacing vehicles that exceed their useful life to support a cost-effective fleet replacement/maintenance program and provide reliable equipment for City maintenance programs.)
- 2. Reject the award and purchase order in the amount of \$210,429.56 to Fritts Ford for the purchase of one Ford F-750 traffic maintenance striping truck and direct staff on alternative actions. (Staff does not recommend this action as this may result in excessive maintenance costs to maintain the existing vehicle, which has exceeded its normal life-cycle, and may result in related potential down-time of the traffic striping maintenance program supported by this vehicle.)

FISCAL IMPACT

AMENDMENT NO. 17 AND 20

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Acting as the legislative body of Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services), adopt Resolution No. 2016-78, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, ordering the annexation of territories to City of Moreno Valley Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services) and approving the amended maps for said district.

SUMMARY

Approval of the proposed resolution will certify annexation of 155 parcels into Community Facilities District (CFD) No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services) ("District"). This action affects two property owners, not the general citizens or taxpayers of the City.

The City requires property owners of new development projects to mitigate the cost of certain impacts created by the proposed development (i.e. the ongoing cost for operation and maintenance of public landscaping and/or street lights installed by the development). As a condition of approval, the property owners are required to provide an ongoing funding source to maintain those improvements. The City created CFD No. 2014-01 to provide the development community with a financing mechanism to assist in satisfying the requirement. After a property owner elects to annex their property into the District, the City can levy a special tax on the property tax bill(s) of the annexed parcel(s). Revenue generated by the District provides a funding source to operate and maintain only those improvements within the District.

RSI Communities, LLC and First Industrial, LP ("Property Owners") have elected to annex their development projects into the District. Detailed parcel information for the properties subject to the conditions of approval is shown in the table below. Annexing into the District will satisfy the condition to provide a funding source for the ongoing maintenance and operation of public improvements (public landscaping and/or street lighting). The Property Owners submitted Landowner Petitions approving the annexation. The City Clerk has confirmed the petitions are valid.

DISCUSSION

District Formation

The District was formed by adoption of Resolution No. 2014-25 to provide an alternative financing tool for the development community. It provides a mechanism to fund the operation and maintenance of street lighting services and maintenance of public landscaping. After a landowner approves annexation of their property into the District and the applicable special tax rate area(s), the City is authorized to levy a special tax onto the annual property tax bill(s). Residential Tract 31618 (southwest corner of Moreno Beach Dr. and Bay Ave.) formed the original boundaries of the District. Since formation of the District, 15 additional landowners have authorized annexation of their properties into the District.

The Rate and Method of Apportionment of Special Tax (RMA) for the District describes the different special tax rate areas, services provided, and the formula to calculate the special tax rate for each of the tax rate areas. Several special tax rate layers were created to accommodate a variety of scenarios to ensure costs are fairly shared between property owners. For example, there is a tax rate layer for "single-family residential street lighting" and one for "street lighting for property other than single-family residential" (e.g. commercial, industrial, or multifamily projects). Different tax rate layers are needed for street lighting because the spacing and size/type of lights differ based on the type of development. Likewise, there are several tax rate areas for maintenance of public landscaping. A property owner's proportionate share of landscape maintenance costs will vary depending upon the total square footage of landscaping to be maintained for that development and the number of properties sharing in the cost.

Annexation to the District

On February 10, 2015, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 889, which designated the entire territory of the City as a future annexation area for the District. Adoption of the Ordinance provides a simplified process for the development community to annex into the District. Annexations can occur without an additional public hearing as long as the annexing landowner provides unanimous consent. Once annexed, parcels are subject to the annual special tax to fund the service(s) they are receiving.

RSI Communities, LLC is approved for a 140 lot residential subdivision and is required

to provide an ongoing funding source for public landscape maintenance and street lighting. First Industrial, LP is approved for a 1.4 million square foot warehouse and is required to provide an ongoing funding source for street lighting. Information for the development project property ("Subject Properties") required to satisfy the conditions of approval is shown in the following table.

The Property Owners have two options to satisfy their conditions of approval:

- A. Submit a Landowner Petition approving annexation of their parcel(s) into the District. Approval of the petition and special tax rate allows the City to annually levy the special tax on the property tax bill(s). This option is only available if there are fewer than 12 registered voters living within the proposed annexation area. The Office of the Riverside County Registrar of Voters confirmed there were no registered voters residing at the Subject Properties, allowing for a special election of the landowners to be conducted; or
- B. Establish a homeowner or property owner association to provide the ongoing maintenance and operation of the improvements.

The Property Owners have elected to annex the Subject Properties into CFD No. 2014-01 and have the special tax applied to the annual property tax bill. The City Clerk received and reviewed the Property Owners' Landowner Petitions and confirmed the Property Owners unanimously approved the annexation of the Subject Properties into the District (Attachment 3). Adoption of the attached resolution (Attachment 1) adds the Subject Properties to the tax rate area(s) identified in the table in the Fiscal Impact section of this report and directs the recordation of the boundary maps and amended notices of special tax lien for Amendment No. 17 and Amendment No. 20 (Attachment 2).

Successful completion of the annexation process satisfies these conditions of approval for both projects.

ALTERNATIVES

 Adopt the proposed resolution. Staff recommends this alternative, as it will annex the Subject Properties into CFD No. 2014-01 at the request of the Property Owners and satisfies their conditions of approval for their proposed developments.

- 2. Do not adopt the proposed resolution. Staff does not recommend this alternative as it is contrary to the Property Owners' request, will not satisfy the condition of approval, and may delay project development.
- 3. Do not adopt the proposed resolution but rather continue the item to a future City Council meeting. Staff does not recommend this alternative as it will delay the Property Owners from satisfying their conditions of approval and may delay project development.

FISCAL IMPACT

Revenue received from the special tax is restricted and can only be used to fund the services for each respective tax rate area. If the revenue received at the maximum special tax rate exceeds what is necessary to fund the services within each tax rate area, a lower amount will be applied to the property tax bills for all properties within the affected tax rate area. The special tax can only be applied to a property tax bill of a parcel wherein their property owner has previously provided approval. Estimated revenue for each project is defined below:

The maximum special tax rates are subject to an annual inflation adjustment based on the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) or five percent (5%), whichever is greater. Each year, the City Council must authorize any proposed CPI adjustment prior to the levy of the special tax onto the property tax bills. Increases to the maximum special tax rate cannot exceed the annual inflationary adjustment without a $2/3^{rds}$ approval of the qualified electors (landowners or registered voters depending upon number of registered voters) within the affected tax rate area.

NOTIFICATION

² The maximum special tax will be based on the final development of the project. The special tax applied to the property tax bill will be based on the needs of the District. It may be lower, but cannot exceed, the maximum special tax.

Annexation documentation was mailed to the Property Owners, which included a cover letter, Landowner Petition, RMA, and an envelope to return the completed petition.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ORDERING THE ANNEXATION OF TERRITORIES TO CITY OF MORENO VALLEY COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2014-01 (MAINTENANCE SERVICES) AND APPROVING THE AMENDED MAPS FOR SAID DISTRICT

WHEREAS, by its Resolution No. 2014-25, the City Council established the City of Moreno Valley Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services) (the "CFD") pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Government Code Section 53311 *et seq.*) (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, by its Ordinance No. 874, the City Council levied an annual special tax against all non-exempt parcels of real property within the CFD (the "Special Tax") to fund street lighting services and landscape maintenance services; and

WHEREAS, in order to permit landowners to efficiently annex developing parcels to the CFD, the City Council, by its Ordinance No. 889 designated the entire territory of the City as a future annexation area for the CFD and approved the second amended and restated rate and method of apportionment for the Special Tax; and

WHEREAS, the landowners of the parcels listed on Exhibit A to this Resolution, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, have submitted to the City a petition requesting and approving annexation of the listed parcels (the "Annexation Parcels") to the CFD; and

WHEREAS, the Annexation Parcels are comprised of the territories shown on the boundary maps (the "Boundary Maps") "Amendment No. 17 to Boundaries of City of Moreno Valley Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services), City of Moreno Valley, County of Riverside, State of California" and "Amendment No. 20 to Boundaries of City of Moreno Valley Community Facilities District No. 2014-01 (Maintenance Services), City of Moreno Valley, County of Riverside, State of California", which are included as Exhibit B to this Resolution, and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to annex the Annexation Parcels to the CFD.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Recitals. The above recitals are all true and correct and are herein incorporated.
- 2. Annexation Approved. The Annexation Parcels are hereby added to and part of the CFD with full legal effect. The Annexation Parcels are subject to the Special Tax associated with the Tax Rate Area(s) indicated on Exhibit A to this Resolution.

- 3. Description of Services. The following is a general description of all services (the "Services") provided in the CFD:
- A. Landscape Maintenance Services: Maintaining, servicing, and operating landscape improvements and associated appurtenances located within the public right-of-way and within dedicated landscape easements for the CFD. These improvements may include but are not limited to parkways, medians, open space landscaping, fencing, monuments, ornamental lighting, drainage, turf, ground cover, shrubs, vines and trees, irrigation systems, and appurtenant facilities and structures. Fundable costs may include, but are not limited to: (i) contracting costs for landscape maintenance services, including litter removal, (ii) salaries and benefits of City staff, (iii) expenses related to equipment, apparatus, and supplies related to these services, (iv) City administrative and overhead costs associated with providing such services within the CFD, and (v) lifecycle costs associated with the repair and replacement of facilities.
- B. Street Lighting Services: Maintaining, servicing, and operating street lights and appurtenant improvements. Fundable costs may include, but are not limited to: (i) contracting costs for street light maintenance, (ii) salaries and benefits of City staff, if the City directly provides street light maintenance services, (iii) utility expenses and the expense related to equipment, apparatus, and supplies related to these services and authorized by the Act, (iv) City administrative and overhead costs associated with providing such services for the CFD, and (v) lifecycle costs associated with the repair and replacement of facilities.

The Annexation Parcels will only be provided with the services indicated on Exhibit A.

- 4. Amended Boundary Maps. The Boundary Maps attached hereto as Exhibit "B" are hereby approved. These maps amend, and do not supersede, the existing maps of the CFD. The City Council directs that said maps be filed with the Riverside County Recorder pursuant to Section 3113 of the Streets and Highways Code.
- 5. Notice of Special Tax Lien. The City Council directs that a revised notice of special tax lien be recorded pursuant to Section 3117.5 of the Streets and Highways Code with respect to the Annexation Parcels associated with the Boundary Maps.
 - 6. This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon adoption.
- 7. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Resolution, and shall maintain on file as a public record this Resolution.
- 8. Severability. That the City Council declares that, should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Resolution be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any

preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this Resolution as hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

9. Repeal of Conflicting Provisions. That all the provisions heretofore adopted by the City Council that are in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed.

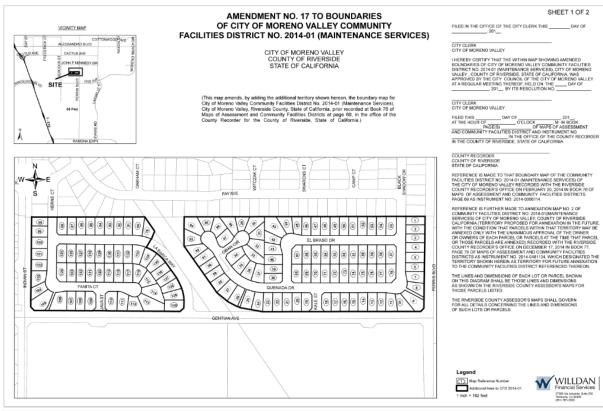

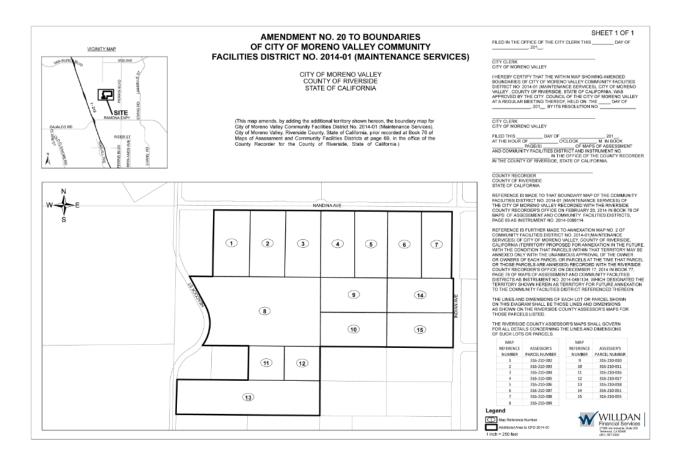

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Approve Resolution No. 2016-79, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, to Amend the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility (MVU).

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of a resolution that would amend Moreno Valley Utility rates to correspond with Southern California Edison rates that became effective on June 1, 2016.

Resolution 2015-32, adopted by the City Council on May 12, 2015, approved the adjustment of MVU rates two times per year (in the spring and the fall) to provide rate stability to its customers. These semi-annual adjustments also allow the rates to be adjusted to correspond with the SCE electric rates as required under the current ENCO agreement and City Council policy.

The proposed adjustments were presented to the Utilities Commission on October 21 and to the Finance Subcommittee on October 25, 2016.

DISCUSSION

Staff recommends approval of the resolution that will amend the electric rates for the Moreno Valley Utility (MVU) to correspond with rates charged by Southern California

ID#2294 Page 1

Edison (SCE). Since the inception of MVU, City Council policy has been to maintain parity with SCE electric rates. Resolution 2006-112 approved implementing a schedule to adjust MVU's rates to correspond with the SCE rate schedule. This policy is also incorporated within the Professional Services Agreement with ENCO Utility Services Moreno Valley, LLC, which requires that MVU adjusts its electric rates to have them correspond with those charged by SCE. In addition, Resolution 2015-32, adopted by the City Council on May 12, 2015, approved the adjustment of MVU rates two times per year (in the spring and the fall) to provide rate stability to its customers.

Effective June 1, 2016, SCE implemented rate adjustments as depicted in the table below. The recommended adjustments ensure compliance with the policies and resolutions noted above.

As with all electric utilities, Moreno Valley Utility's service year is divided into two categories: Winter (October to June) and Summer (June to October). Adjustments to the rates to have them correspond with the SCE rates as presented in this report will generally decrease MVU's rate schedules for both the summer season and the winter season.

Rates are structured to reflect usage; the table below shows the monthly impact to customers during the summer season and winter season.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve proposed resolution to amend the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility. Staff recommends this alternative as the proposed amended electric rates will allow the City's utility to comply with established Council-adopted policies and practices.
- **2.** Do not approve proposed resolution to amend the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility. Staff does not recommend this alternative because the resolution is needed to keep the Utility in compliance with established Council-adopted policies and practices.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed rate adjustment is estimated to decrease revenue by an average of \$24,300 per month. It is anticipated that net income will remain positive for fiscal year 2016/2017.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016-79

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, TO AMEND THE ELECTRIC RATES FOR MORENO VALLEY UTILITY

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley (the "City"), a municipal corporation, is authorized pursuant to Article XI, Section 9(a) of the California Constitution to establish, purchase, and operate public works to furnish its inhabitants with light, water, power, heat, transportation, or means of communication; and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2001, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley approved Resolution No. 2001-33 and, as amended by Resolution 2002-46, authorized the formation of a municipally owned utility for the purpose of providing electrical power, storm water, telephone telecommunications, cable TV, water, natural gas, and sanitary sewer; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document for Moreno Valley Utility which states, in part, that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the City Council; and

WHEREAS, on January 13, 2004, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2004-05 establishing the electric rates for Moreno Valley Utility; and

WHEREAS, on September 26, 2006, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2006-112 implementing a schedule to adjust Moreno Valley Utility electric rates to reflect the same schedule as Southern California Edison; and

WHEREAS, there are sections of the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document that contain rules which define the terms and conditions under which electric service will be provided to the customer; and

WHEREAS, there are rules, fees, charges, and rates associated with providing the services identified in these documents. These rules, fees, charges, and rates are deemed necessary and equitable for services rendered and are required to fund in whole or in part, all of the services required to facilitate the delivery of electric distribution pursuant to the rules; and

WHEREAS, Urgency Ordinance No. 651 was adopted by the City Council on December 9, 2003, allowing for the adoption of rates by resolution.

Applying for the Medical Baseline Allocation:

- 1. Request application from Moreno Valley Utility by telephone, mail or in person
- 2. Complete application.
- 3. The patient's physician will need to fill out the required information on the application and sign it certifying the medical need.
- 4. The customer can mail or bring the application to Moreno Valley Utility's offices
- 5. Once the application is reviewed and approved, the Medical Baseline Allocation will be effective on the next regular electric billing.
- 6. Applications must be renewed every two years.
- 7. Low Income Program A low-income assistance discount program is offered under this standard residential rate. To be considered for this discount, an application must be filed with Moreno Valley Utility. To be eligible for this discount, the income of the customer, including all members of the household, must meet the income levels of the program and can be no more than 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Under this program a discount for qualified low-income residents of 20% is provided on monthly energy charges. Discount

- applies to energy charges only. The customer charge, public purpose charge, service fees and all taxes are calculated at the standard rates.
- 8. Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) Program: The FERA discount program is offered under the standard residential rate. To be considered for this discount, an application must be filed with Moreno Valley Utility. To be eligible for this discount the household must consist of three or more persons where the total gross income from all sources is no more than 250% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Under this program a discount for qualified FERA households of 12% is provided on monthly energy charges. Discount applies to energy charges only. The customer charge, public purpose charge, service fees and all taxes are calculated at the standard rates.

- 4. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.
- 5. Voltage Discount: The monthly Facilities Related Demand Charge will be reduced by 23.3% for service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV through 12 kV. The energy charge will be reduced by \$.00074 per kWh for service delivered and metered at voltages of 2 kV through 12 kV.
- 6. Excess Transformer Capacity: Excess Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. Excess Transformer Capacity shall be billed at the amount shown in the rates section above.
- 7. Power Factor Adjustment: When Maximum Demand has exceeded 200 kW for three consecutive months, kilovar metering will be installed as soon as practical, and thereafter, until the Maximum Demand has been less than 150 kW for twelve consecutive months, the billing will be adjusted each month for power factor.
 - a. Adjustment Rate:
 - For service delivered and metered at voltages 12 kV or less, the billing will be increased by \$0.55 per kilovar of maximum reactive demand.
 - b. Determining the Reactive Demand:

- i. Service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV or greater:
 - The maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.
 - ii. Services delivered and metered at voltages less than 4 kV:
 - For customers with metering used for billing that measures reactive demand, the maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.
 - 2. For customers with metering used for billing that measures kilovar-hours instead of reactive demand, the kilovars of reactive demand shall be calculated by multiplying the kilowatts of measured maximum demand by the ratio of the kilovar-hours to the kilowatt-hours. Demands in kilowatts and kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A ratchet device will be installed on the kilovar-hour meter to prevent its reverse operation on leading power factors.

Holidays are defined as New Year's Day (January 1), Martin Luther King's Birthday (third Monday in January), Washington's Birthday (third Monday in February), Memorial Day (last Monday in May), Independence Day (July 4), Labor Day (first Monday in September), Veterans Day (November 11), Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in November), and Christmas Day (December 25).

When any holiday listed above falls on Sunday, the following Monday will be recognized as an off-peak period. No change will be made for holidays falling on Saturday.

- Summer and Winter Seasons are defined as follows: The Summer season begins at 12:00 a.m. on June 1 and will continue until 12:00 a.m. on October 1 each year. The Winter season begins at 12:00 a.m. on October 1 and continues until 12:00 a.m. on June 1 of the following year.
- 3. Voltage: Service will be supplied at one standard voltage.
- 4. Billing Demand: The Billing Demand shall be the kilowatts of Maximum Demand, determined to the nearest kW. The Billing Demand shall be the greater of the kilowatts of Maximum Demand recorded (or established for) the monthly billing period or 50% of the highest Maximum Demand established in the preceding eleven months (Ratcheted Demand).
- 5. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.
- 6. Excess Transformer Capacity: Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. Excess Transformer Capacity shall be billed at the amount shown in the rates section above.
- 7. Power Factor Adjustment: The billing will be adjusted each month for power factor.
 - a. Adjustment Rate: The customer's bill will be increased each month for the power factor \$0.51 per kilovar of maximum reactive demand.
 - b. The maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15 minute metered interval in the month. For customers with metering used for billing that measures kilovar-hours instead of reactive demand, the

kilovars of reactive demand shall be calculated by multiplying the kilowatts of measured maximum demand by the ratio of the kilovar-hours to the kilowatt-hours. Demands in kilowatts and kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on the kilovar-hour meter to prevent its reverse operation on leading power factors.

SCHEDULE SE - SERVICE ESTABLISHMENT CHARGE

Applicability

Applicable to general service and domestic service customers.

Territory

Within the entire territory served by Moreno Valley Utility.

<u>Rate</u>

For each establishment of electric service, a charge will apply.

Special Conditions

- 1. The service establishment charge is in addition to the charges calculated on the applicable rate schedule and will be made each time an account is established.
- 2. Establishment means each time an account is opened, including a turn on of electric service or a change of name that requires a meter reading.
- 3. If the customer requests electric service be established on the same day as his request or outside regular business hours, an additional charge will apply.

SCHEDULE NEM - NET ENERGY METERING

Applicability

Applicable to general service and domestic service customers who have eligible renewable energy generation systems connected to MVU's system (interconnected) and meet program requirements.

Territory

Within the entire territory served by Moreno Valley Utility.

Net Surplus Compensation Rate

The net surplus compensation rate shall be \$0.05852 per kWh applied to any net surplus energy remaining at the end of the customer's twelve (12) month billing period ("relevant period").

Special Conditions

- NEM customers will receive a credit for the surplus electricity supplied to MVU's system.
- 2. This credit will be applied to the customer's energy bill, to offset all or part of the costs associated with the energy that is consumed each month.
- 3. Residential accounts are billed once a year for "net" energy consumed or generated over the previous 12 months, if any.
- 4. Small business accounts served under the General Service Rate also qualify for annual billing.
- 5. Large business NEM accounts under the Large General Service Rate are billed monthly for their energy usage.
- Net surplus energy is the amount of generated kilowatt-hours (kWh) energy that is exported to MVU's system that exceeds the amount that is received from MVU.
- 7. Any net surplus energy remaining at the end of the 12-month billing period (also called the "relevant period") will be given a monetary value known as the Net Surplus Compensation Rate (NSCR).
- 8. The NSCR value is established by MVU to reflect the costs MVU avoids in procuring power during the time period net surplus generators are likely to produce excess power.

- Customers may choose to either roll over the monetary value of any net surplus energy to the next billing cycle, or receive payment for any net surplus energy at the end of your 12-month relevant period.
- 10. Customers will be billed monthly for nominal non-energy-related charges such as taxes.

SCHEDULE ED - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ("ED") RATE

Applicability

Commercial or industrial end-use customers that would otherwise receive service under Electric Rate Schedule TOU-LGS (Time of Use-Large General Service) and meet certain criteria as established and adopted by resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley may take advantage of the ED rate as a New Customer or Expanded Load Customer. This ED rate is applicable to all or part of the services provided to New Customers and Expanded Load Customers, as such terms are defined herein. Local Hiring Incentive applicable to certain other rate classes as described in Special Condition No. 6.

- 1. A New Customer shall be a customer seeking to locate a new business or relocate an existing business (not currently located within the territory served by Moreno Valley Utility) within Moreno Valley Utility's service territory.
- 2. An Expanded Load Customer shall be an existing Moreno Valley Utility TOU-LGS customer that is adding new load to Moreno Valley by a minimum of 200 kW based upon the customer's past electrical demand as determined by Moreno Valley Utility. The expanded load can be at the customer's current site, or at a new site within the Moreno Valley Utility service territory. The ED rate will only be applied to the expanded load as determined in Section 5 below.
- 3. A New Customer shall meet the following criteria:
 - a. Targeted industries
 - i. Logistics/Distribution
 - ii. Medical/Healthcare
 - iii. Auto Dealerships
 - b.Job Creation

i. Tier 1 Discount Rateii. Tier 2 Discount Rate500 – 999 jobs

iii. Tier 3 Discount Rate greater than 1000 jobs
iv. Tier 4 Discount Rate 350 jobs minimum

V. Tier 5 Discount Pate 200 jobs minimum

v. Tier 5 Discount Rate 200 jobs minimum

c. City Revenue Producer – either sales tax or use tax generation

i. Tier 1a Discount Rate

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Resolution No. 2016-XX Date Adopted: November 15, 2016

ii. Tier 4 Discount Rate - minimum \$40,000 annual sales tax revenue to the City

Territory

Within the entire territory served by Moreno Valley Utility.

Character of Service

The service provided hereunder shall be alternating current with regulated frequency of 60 hertz, three-phase, or a combination single and three-phase served through one meter, at a standard voltage not to exceed 480 volts, or as may be specified by the Electric Division. To be eligible to participate all customers must have a demand meter.

Rates

Except as provided herein, or in the Economic Development Rate Agreement, all charges and provisions of the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule shall apply. The applicable Energy Charge and Demand Charge under the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule will be reduced as follows:

Special Conditions

- 1. <u>Term</u>: Economic Development Rate Agreements entered into under this Schedule shall be for a single five-year term, except for Tier 5, which shall be for a single sixteen-year term.
- 2. <u>Approval</u>: Application of this Rate Schedule shall be subject to the approval of the City Manager or his designee, based on meeting the eligibility criteria outlined herein.
- 3. <u>Agreement</u>: The customer must sign a standard Moreno Valley Economic Development Rate Agreement in order for the rates under this Schedule to be applicable. In addition to the other terms of this Schedule, the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall require the customer to reimburse Moreno Valley for all rate reductions received under this Schedule, if the customer fails to maintain the required minimum load during the applicable term of the Agreement.
- 4. Minimum Load: Customers qualifying under this Schedule as a New Customer with a projected minimum monthly electric demand of at least 500 kW or as an Expanded Load Customer under Applicability Sections 1 and 2 above, respectively, must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for five years for Tiers 1 through 4 and sixteen years for Tier 5 from the date service is first rendered under this Schedule as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement.
- 5. <u>Jobs</u>: Job as prescribed in Section 3c above is defined as Full Time Equivalent that is working at least 1750 hours per year. The Customer retains authority in making individual hiring decisions. This program does not require the Customer to hire any person who does not have the experience and ability to qualify such persons for a job.
- 6. Local Hiring Incentive: The Local Hiring Incentive is available for Tier 1 through Tier 5. Customers who qualify under Tiers 1 4 and voluntarily hire at least 20% of Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents will receive an additional discount of 2%; those Customers who hire at least 40% of Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents will receive an additional discount of 4%. For Customers eligible for the Tier 5 discount, the Local Hiring Incentive is an additional 1% discount for Customers who voluntarily hire at least 20% of FTE employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents. The additional 1% discount will be applied to the first five years of the sixteen-year term. Any additional discounts will apply to the Energy Charge and Demand Charge. Customers must certify the local hire percentage each year to remain eligible for the additional discount.
- 7. <u>Base Period Usage</u>: Base Period Usage shall be established and agreed to in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Expanded Load

Customers. Base Period Usage shall be the average monthly energy use and demand for the customer during the last three years of service to the customer, from the date ending the last payment period before the date of the Agreement. Expanded Load qualifying for the rate under this Schedule shall be measured as the difference between the new monthly, meter documented energy use and demand, and the Base Period Usage.

- 8. <u>State Mandated Public Purpose Program Charge</u>: All bills rendered under this Schedule shall be subject to the Public Purpose Program Charge as established by the City Council.
- 9. Miscellaneous Fees and Charges: Rates charged pursuant to this Schedule shall be subject to any Energy Users Taxes, Utility Users Taxes, and any other governmental taxes, duties, or fees which are applicable to Electric Service provided to Customer by the City of Moreno Valley. Rates are also subject to adjustment, as established by the City of Moreno Valley City Council in response to federal or state climate change laws, renewable portfolio standard or other mandated legislation. These adjustments may include but are not limited to charges to mitigate the impacts of greenhouse gas emissions or "green power" premiums.
- 10. Expanded Load: Expanded Load customers applying for this rate must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Utility that the expanded load is new to Moreno Valley.
- 11. Effective Date: The effective date of the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall commence within 12 months from the date of the City's approval, or the Agreement becomes null and void. The Agreement becomes effective upon execution by the parties, and the Economic Development Rate commences upon written notice by customer, and coincides with the customer's normal billing cycle.
- 12. <u>Reapplication</u>: Customers who have received service under the Economic Development Rate are eligible to reapply for the rate as an Expanded Load Customer 12 months after their current Economic Development Rate Agreement has expired, if they meet the criteria therefore.
- 13. <u>Restrictions</u>: Residential customers and federal, state or local government agencies are not eligible to apply for service under this Schedule.
- 14. <u>City Manager</u>: The City Manager or his/her designee may offer to customers an Economic Development Rate and term based upon the actual cost to serve the customer. The customer must sign a Moreno Valley Economic Development Rate Agreement, and such Agreement shall be approved by the City Council. All other terms and conditions under this rate schedule shall apply.

SCHEDULE ED-BR - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT- BUSINESS RETENTION RATE

Applicability

This Schedule is applicable to the anchor stores at Stoneridge Towne Centre and Moreno Beach Plaza, whose building size is 25,000 square feet or larger and have 30 or more employees.

1. The Customer must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the City that relocation of its entire operation to a site outside of Moreno Valley Utility's service territory is a viable alternative or that the threat of closure of the Customer's existing facilities is otherwise imminent.

2. The Customer must provide:

- a.An affidavit that "but for" the economic development retention rate incentives, in combination with other city-sponsored incentives, such customer would relocate outside of the City's electric service territory, and
- b. Substantial evidence demonstrating the business has considered viable locations outside of Moreno Valley's service territory including but not limited to incentive offer letters from competing states, local jurisdictions and economic development organizations and/or real estate sale and lease agreements for competing sites, or
- c. Substantial evidence documenting the imminent threat of facility closure, including but not limited to letters from business owners or appropriate corporate officers documenting the circumstances which have led to this imminent threat and why the Business Retention Rate is necessary to retain the business within Moreno Valley Utility's service territory.
- 3. The Customer must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for five years from the date service is first rendered as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention.

Territory

Within the entire territory served by Moreno Valley Utility.

<u>Rates</u>

Except as provided herein, or in the Economic Development Business Retention Rate Agreement, all charges and provisions of the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule shall apply. The applicable Energy Charge and Demand Charge under the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule will be reduced as follows:

Year 3 20%
Year 4 0%
Year 5 0%

Special Conditions

- 1. <u>Term</u>: Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention entered into under this Schedule shall be for a single five-year term.
- 2. <u>Approval</u>: Application of this Rate Schedule shall be subject to the approval of the Public Works Director or his designee, based on meeting the eligibility criteria outlined herein.
- 3. <u>Agreement</u>: The customer must sign a standard Moreno Valley Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention in order for the rates under this Schedule to be applicable. In addition to the terms of this Schedule, the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention shall require the customer to reimburse Moreno Valley for all rate reductions received under this Schedule, if the customer fails to maintain the required minimum load during the five-year term of the Agreement.
- 4. Minimum Load: All customers must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for five years from the date service is first rendered under this Schedule as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention.
- 5. <u>State Mandated Public Purpose Charge</u>: All bills rendered under this Schedule shall be subject to the Public Purpose Charge as established by the City Council.
- 6. <u>Miscellaneous Fees and Charges</u>: Rates charged pursuant to this Schedule shall be subject to any Energy Users Taxes, Utility Users Taxes, and any other governmental taxes, duties, or fees which are applicable to Electric Service provided to Customer by the City of Moreno Valley. Rates are also subject to adjustment, as established by the City of Moreno Valley City Council in response to federal or state climate change laws, renewable portfolio standard or other mandated legislation. These adjustments may include but are not limited to charges to mitigate the impacts of greenhouse gas emissions or "green power" premiums.

- 7. <u>Effective Date</u>: The Agreement becomes effective upon execution by the parties, and the Economic Development Business Retention Rate commences with the customer's normal billing cycle following execution of the Agreement by both parties.
- 8. <u>Restrictions</u>: Residential customers, small commercial customers, and federal, state or local government agencies are not eligible to apply for service under this Schedule.

Recommendation:

Approve each Third Amendment to Agreement for Professional Consultant Services with Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., Civil Source, Inc., Gong Enterprises, Inc., HR Green California, Inc., Hunsaker & Associates, Inc., Michael Baker International, Inc., to provide on-call engineering plan check services to the Land Development Division.
- Authorize the City Manager to execute each Third Amendment to Agreement for Professional Consultant Services with Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., Civil Source, Inc., Gong Enterprises, Inc., HR Green California, Inc., Hunsaker & Associates, Inc., Michael Baker International, Inc., subject to the approval of the City Attorney.
- 3. Authorize the Chief Financial Officer to approve any subsequent related purchase orders, including those over \$100,000, to Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., Civil Source, Inc., Gong Enterprises, Inc., HR Green California, Inc., Hunsaker & Associates, Inc., Michael Baker International, Inc., up to a maximum of four annual extensions or amendments from the original Agreement effective date with each consultant, in accordance with the approved terms of the Agreements.
- 4. Authorize the Chief Financial Officer to make any necessary budget adjustment appropriations related to expenditures and the equal and offsetting revenues.

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5. Authorize the Public Works Director to execute subsequent amendments or extensions to the Agreements, subject to the approval of the City Attorney.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of each Third Amendment to Agreement with various consultants through which consultants will provide on-call engineering plan check services to the Land Development Division. Firms were selected following review, rating and reference checks of proposals submitted to the City. The consultants will augment staff to ensure timely review of engineering plans.

DISCUSSION

To the extent possible, the review of engineering plans and documents will be conducted by in-house City staff. The plan check consultants will assist with project overflow in order to maintain the division's goal of a timely plan review turn-around.

On September 15, 2014, the City received twelve (12) proposals for engineering plan check consultant services. City staff reviewed and rated the proposals. Reference checks were provided for the top scoring firms for further evaluation and selection. Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., Civil Source, Inc., Gong Enterprises, Inc., HR Green California, Inc., Hunsaker & Associates, Inc., and Michael Baker International, Inc. were selected as a result of a competitive selection process. They were identified as the most qualified consultants to complete engineering plan check services.

On October 28, 2014, the City Council approved each Agreement for Professional Consultant Services with Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., Civil Source, Inc., Gong Enterprises, Inc., HR Green California, Inc., Hunsaker & Associates, Inc., and Michael Baker International, Inc. Subsequently, a Second Amendment to Agreement was executed for each of the six consultants to extend the Agreement termination date.

Because the current Procurement Policy (Policy #3.18, Section V.B.3) allows the original agreement to be extended for four additional one-year terms, staff is requesting the City Council authorize the City Manager to approve the Third Amendment and any future extensions or amendments, as well as associated Purchase Orders for the Amendment and all future amendments/extensions available, in accordance with the terms of the Agreement and subject to the approval of the City Attorney. Such extensions and amendments shall only be entered into upon determination that sufficient funding appropriations and program approvals have been granted by the City Council and demonstration by the consultant of having provided satisfactory performance of the services, and both the City and the consultant mutually agreeing to extend the Agreement.

ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative helps achieve the Land Development Division goal of a timely plan review turn-around for development projects.

2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will not help achieve the Land Development Division's goal of a timely plan review turn-around and could cause the delay of development projects through the approval process.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Land Development Division budget for other professional services (1010-70-29-20410-620299) for Fiscal Year 2016/2017 is \$196,300. However, the amount spent for professional consultant plan check services is funded through revenue received from the City's plan review fees in connection with services requested by developers/land owners. The costs of the required plan check services are fully recoverable and paid by the developers/land owners. Each plan check consultant receives compensation equal to 65% of the City's plan review fees collected for those plans and documents reviewed except for final maps which are 75% of the City's plan review fees collected for final maps reviewed for specific projects. It is recommended that any necessary future budget adjustment appropriations be made related to the expenditures and the equal and offsetting revenues. There is no negative impact to the General Fund.

THIRD AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL CONSULTANT SERVICES

The Third Amendment to Agreement is by and between the CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "City," and Bureau Veritas North America, Inc., hereinafter referred to as "Consultant." This Third Amendment to Agreement is made and entered into effective on the date the City signs this Amendment.

RECITALS:

Whereas, the City and Consultant entered into an Agreement entitled "AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL CONSULTANT SERVICES," hereinafter referred to as "Agreement," dated November 3, 2014.

Whereas, the Consultant is providing temporary Engineering Plan Check Services.

Whereas, the Agreement was amended on December 10, 2015 to extend the professional consultant services in the First Amendment to Agreement for Professional Consultant Services.

Whereas, the Agreement was further amended on August 9, 2016 to extend the professional consultant services in the Second Amendment to Agreement for Professional Consultant Services.

Whereas, it is desirable to further amend the Agreement to extend the professional consultant services as is more particularly described in Section 1 of this Third Amendment.

SECTION 1 AMENDMENT TO ORIGINAL AGREEMENT:

1.1 The Agreement termination date of **June 30, 2017** is not extended by this Amendment, unless the termination date is further extended by an Amendment to the Agreement.

- 1.2 The City agrees to pay the Consultant and the Consultant agrees to receive a compensation equal to 65% of City plan review fees for those plans and documents reviewed in the scope of services other than final maps and 75% of City plan review fees for final maps reviewed in accordance with the City Schedule of Fees, Charges, and Rates as updated annually in accordance with the payment terms provided on Exhibit "D" of the Agreement. There shall be no "Not-to-Exceed" amount on payment under this Agreement.
- 1.3 The Agreement is hereby further amended to add the following to paragraph 7 of the Agreement:

TERM OF MULTI-YEAR AGREEMENT

- (a) This contractual agreement will be subject to the City Council approving the fiscal year annual budget. This contractual agreement shall be binding upon all parties for a period of one (1) fiscal year and may be extended for an additional four (4) fiscal years from the original agreement effective date pending funding approval in the new fiscal year's budget.
- (b) The following clause applies to this project: "It should be noted that this multi-year agreement may be continued each fiscal year only after funding appropriations and program approvals have been granted by the City Council. In the event that the City Council does not grant necessary funding appropriations and/or program approval, then the affected multi-year agreement becomes null and void, effective July 1st of the fiscal year for which such approvals have been denied."

SECTION 2

2.1 Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Amendment, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

- Extend the addenda of these Agreements to employees represented by the Moreno Valley Confidential Management Employees as well as those in unrepresented classifications.

SUMMARY

The current 2015-2017 Memoranda of Understandings (MOUs) between the City and its three bargaining groups end on June 30, 2017. The MOUs with all bargaining groups provided for annual re-openers on City contributions to medical insurance premiums. Negotiations have been completed with the Moreno Valley City Employees Association (MVCEA) and the Moreno Valley Management Association (MVMA); the Moreno Valley Confidential Management Employees (MVCME) bargaining unit opted for a parity agreement with MVMA, precluding the need for separate negotiations with that unit. The language in the MVCME agreement allows implementation of all terms for that unit without any requirement for further updates to the MOU itself.

DISCUSSION

The City received notice of the 2017 medical insurance rates in July of 2016 indicating premium increases of up to 18.9% for the 2017 coverage year. While most insurance rates are increasing and will reduce the take home pay of a majority of City employees, the employees most significantly impacted by the premium increases are those with family insurance coverage. Management has reached Tentative Agreements with the Associations, which have been ratified by the Associations' membership, to increase the benefit credits of those employees with family insurance coverage by \$140.00 per month for full-time career employees and \$62.00 per month for part-time career employees. This amount is within the authority granted to the negotiation team by City Council. The effective dates of the MOU addenda shall be January 1, 2017 through June 30, 2017. All other provisions of the 2015-2017 MOUs will remain in effect.

Having an adequate level of medical benefits for recruitment and retention of City staff ensures assignment of highly qualified and trained personnel to achieve Momentum MoVal priorities, objectives and initiatives.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve the addenda to the Memoranda of Understandings between the City of Moreno Valley and the Moreno Valley City Employees Association (Attachment 1), and Moreno Valley Management Association (Attachment 2) for the period of January 1, 2017 through June 30, 2017. Extend the provisions of these Agreements to employees represented by the Moreno Valley Confidential Management Employees as well as those in unrepresented classifications. Staff recommends this alternative. Council action to approve the attached Memoranda of Understanding follows previous approval of Tentative Agreements with MVCEA and MVMA (and, by extension MVCME), and will fulfill terms of the City's Employer/Employee Relations Resolution.
- Not approve recommendations listed above and instead direct staff to re-open negotiations with employee associations. Staff does not recommend this alternative.

FISCAL IMPACT

The cost to implement the terms of the Memoranda of Understanding Addendas is projected at \$48,720, with the General Fund supporting 50% of this cost. The cost to provide the additional insurance coverage can be absorbed within the current approved budgets.

SUMMARY

This report recommends the award of steel for substation structures for the Moreno Valley Utility Kitching Substation and Switchyard. The project is funded with 2015 Lease Revenue Bond and MVU operating monies, and has been approved in the 2016/2017 Capital Improvement Plan. The total cost of the steel including a 10% contingency is \$248,100. The Kitching Substation project is currently under budget and is anticipated to be completed within budget.

This item was presented to the Finance Subcommittee on December 7, 2016 and to the Utilities Commission on December 14, 2016.

DISCUSSION

Moreno Valley Utility's Distribution System Planning for the Years 2016 through 2020 has identified the need for the Kitching Substation as a high priority project to accommodate the planned development of large industrial projects with approximately 8 million square feet of new industrial space. The substation will also improve the reliability and operational flexibility of the electric distribution system in the south industrial area of the City.

An Interconnection Facilities Agreement (IFA) between Southern California Edison (SCE) and the City was approved by City Council on September 6, 2016. The IFA allows the City to design and construct the Kitching Switchyard on behalf of SCE. Once commissioned, the Kitching Switchyard will be deeded to SCE. The steel for substation structures is for both the Kitching Substation and the Kitching Switchyard. The specifications were prepared by HDR, Inc., the project's design consultant, and are based on SCE specifications since the Switchyard will ultimately be owned and operated by SCE. A Request for Quotes (RFQ) was prepared and placed on PlanetBids for SCE approved vendors to review.

The following bids were received. The lowest, responsive bidder was Washington Iron Works. The total bid includes a 10% contingency, which may not be used. Staff is recommending that the City issue a Purchase Order to Washington Iron Works for \$248,100.

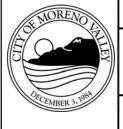

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of a contract with High Country Line Construction, Inc. to construct the Kitching Street Electrical Substation and Switchyard located at the northwest corner of Kitching Street and Edwin Road. This new substation with eight

circuits will help satisfy existing and projected future electrical demand in the City's South Industrial Area. This industrial area requires additional capacity as early as 2016, as identified in the 2016-2020 Moreno Valley Utility Distribution System Planning Study Report. The South Industrial Area is impacted by the rapid development of more than 8 million square feet of new industrial space and demand from existing space that is ready to be occupied. The cumulative total of the Kitching Substation project including the eight circuits is budgeted at \$17,760,000. The substation and circuit projects have been approved in the FY 2016/2017 Capital Improvement Plan. The cost for the Kitching Street Electrical Substation and Switchyard continues to remain within budget.

The construction award contract was provided to the Finance Subcommittee and the Utility Commission for review on December 7, 2016 and December 14, 2016, respectively.

DISCUSSION

On November 24, 2015, the City Council approved the bid award for design of the Kitching Street Electrical Substation and Switchyard. The design has been substantially completed.

A Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) was approved by the City Council on March 15, 2016. A mitigation measure was proposed pertaining to two plant species. The mitigation measure required a focused plant survey to be conducted during the blooming season of April through June. The survey was conducted on April 7, 2016. The two plant species were not identified on the site.

Formal bidding procedures have been followed in conformance with Public Contract Code. For efficiency, one contractor was selected to construct both the Moreno Valley Utility owned substation as well as the switchyard. While the substation will be owned and operated by MVU, the switchyard will ultimately be owned and operated by SCE. Two bids were received as follows:

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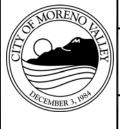

AGREEMENT

PROJECT NO. 805 0027 KITCHING STREET ELECTRICAL SUBSTATION AND SWITCHYARD

THIS Agreement, effective as of the date signed by the City of Moreno Valley by and between the City of Moreno Valley, a municipal corporation, County of Riverside, State of California, hereinafter called the "City" and High Country Line Construction, Inc., hereinafter called the "Contractor."

That the City and the Contractor for the consideration hereinafter named, agree as follows:

- **1. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS**. The Contract Documents consist of the following, which are incorporated herein by this reference:
 - A. Governmental approvals, including, but not limited to, permits required for the Work
 - B. Any and all Contract Change Orders issued after execution of this Agreement
 - C. This Agreement
 - D. Addenda Nos. 1 inclusive, issued prior to the opening of the Bids
 - E. City Special Provisions, including the General Provisions and Technical Provisions
 - F. Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction ("Greenbook") latest edition in effect at the Bid Deadline, as modified by the City Special Provisions
 - G. Reference Specifications/Reference Documents other than those listed in paragraph 2, below
 - H. Project Plans
 - I. City Standard Plans
 - J. The bound Bidding Documents
 - K. Contractor's Certificates of Insurance and Additional Insured Endorsements
 - L. Contractor's Bidder's Proposal and Subcontractor Listing

In the event of conflict between any of the Contract Documents, the provisions placing a more stringent requirement on the Contractor shall prevail. The Contractor shall provide the better quality or greater quantity of Work and/or materials unless otherwise directed by City in writing. In the event none of the Contract Documents place a more stringent requirement or greater burden on the Contractor, the controlling provision shall be that which is found in the document with higher precedence in accordance with the above order of precedence.

- **2. REFERENCE DOCUMENTS**. The following Reference Documents are not considered Contract Documents and are made available to the Contractor for informational purposes:
 - A. SWPPP
 - B. Mitigated Negative Declaration Addendum and Related Studies
- **3. SCOPE OF WORK**. The Contractor shall perform and provide all materials, tools, equipment, labor, and services necessary to complete the Work described in the Contract Documents, except as otherwise provided in the Plans, Standard Specifications, or City Special Provisions to be the responsibility of others.
- 4. PAYMENT.

- 4.1. **Contract Price and Basis for Payment**. In consideration for the Contractor's full, complete, timely, and faithful performance of the Work required by the Contract Documents, the City shall pay Contractor for the actual quantity of Work required under the Bid Items awarded by the City performed in accordance with the lump sum prices and unit prices for Bid Items and Alternate Bid Items, if any, set forth the Bidder's Proposal submitted with the Bid. The sum of the unit prices and lump sum prices for the Base Bid Items awarded by the City is Four Million Three Hundred Ninety Six Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$4,396,070) ("Contract Price"). It is understood and agreed that the quantities set forth in the Bidder's Proposal for which unit prices are fixed are estimates only and that City will pay and Contractor will accept, as full payment for these items of work, the unit prices set forth in the Bidder's Proposal multiplied by the actual number of units performed, constructed, or completed as directed by the City Engineer.
- 4.2. **Payment Procedures**. Based upon applications for payment submitted by the Contractor to the City, the City shall make payments to the Contractor in accordance with Article 9 of the Standard Specifications, as modified by Article 9 of the City Special Provisions.

5. CONTRACT TIME.

A. Initial Notice to Proceed. After the Agreement has been fully executed by the Contractor and the City, the City shall issue the "Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements." The date specified in the Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements constitutes the date of commencement of the Contract Time of One Hundred Thirty (130) Working Days. The Contract Time includes the time necessary to fulfill preconstruction requirements and to complete construction of the Project (except as adjusted by subsequent Change Orders).

The Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements shall further specify that Contractor must complete the preconstruction requirements within **Ten (10) Working Days** after the date of commencement of the Contract Time; this duration is part of the Contract Time.

Critical preconstruction requirements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Submitting and obtaining approval of the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP)
- Submitting and obtaining approval of critical required submittals (Civil and Electrical)
- Installation of the approved Project Identification Signs
- Obtaining an approved no fee Encroachment Permit from the City of Moreno Valley
- Notifying all agencies, utilities, residents, etc., as outlined in the Bidding Documents
- Completion of all pre-construction activities under Environmental Mitigations.

If the City's issuance of a Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements is delayed due to Contractor's failure to return the fully executed Agreement and insurance and bond documents within ten (10) Working Days after Contract award, then Contractor agrees to the deduction of one (1) Working Day from the number of days to complete the Project for every Working Day of delay in the City's receipt of said documents. This right is in addition to and does not affect the City's right to demand forfeiture of Contractor's Bid Security if Contractor persistently delays in providing the required documentation.

B. Notice to Proceed with Construction. After all preconstruction requirements are met in accordance with the Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements, the City shall issue the "Notice to Proceed with Construction," at which time the Contractor shall diligently

prosecute the Work, including corrective items of Work, day to day thereafter, within the remaining Contract Time.

6. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES AND CONTROL OF WORK.

6.1. **Liquidated Damages.** The Contractor and City (collectively, the "Parties") have agreed to liquidate damages with respect to Contractor's failure to fulfill the preconstruction requirements, and/or failure to complete the Work within the Contract Time. The Parties intend for the liquidated damages set forth herein to apply to this Contract as set forth in Government Code Section 53069.85. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the liquidated damages are intended to compensate the City solely for Contractor's failure to meet the deadline for completion of the Work and will not excuse Contractor from liability from any other breach, including any failure of the Work to conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents.

In the event that Contractor fails to fulfill the preconstruction requirements and/or fails to complete the Work within the Contract Time, Contractor agrees to pay the City \$2,000.00 per Calendar day that completion of the Work is delayed beyond the Contract Time, as adjusted by Contract Change Orders. The Contractor will not be assessed liquidated damages for delays occasioned by the failure of the City or of the owner of a utility to provide for the removal or relocation of utility facilities.

The Contractor and City acknowledge and agree that the foregoing liquidated damages have been set based on an evaluation of damages that the City will incur in the event of late completion of the Work. The Contractor and City acknowledge and agree that the amount of such damages are impossible to ascertain as of the date of execution hereof and have agreed to such liquidated damages to fix the City's damages and to avoid later disputes. It is understood and agreed by Contractor that liquidated damages payable pursuant to this Agreement are not a penalty and that such amounts are not manifestly unreasonable under the circumstances existing as of the date of execution of this Agreement.

It is further mutually agreed that the City will have the right to deduct liquidated damages against progress payments or retainage and that the City will issue a Change Order or Construction Change Directive and reduce the Contract Price accordingly. In the event the remaining unpaid Contract Price is insufficient to cover the full amount of liquidated damages, Contractor shall pay the difference to the City.

- 6.2. Any work completed by the Contractor after the issuance of a Stop Work Notice by the City shall be rejected and/or removed and replaced as specified in Section 2-11 of the Special Provisions.
- 6.3. Owner is Exempt from Liability for Early Completion Delay Damages. While the Contractor may schedule completion of all of the Work, or portions thereof, earlier than the Contract Time, the Owner is exempt from liability for and the Contractor will not be entitled to an adjustment of the Contract Sum or to any additional costs, damages, including, but not limited to, claims for extended general conditions costs, home office overhead, jobsite overhead, and management or administrative costs, or compensation whatsoever, for use of float time or for Contractor's inability to complete the Work earlier than the Contract Time for any reason whatsoever, including but not limited to, delay cause by Owner or other Excusable Compensable Delay. See Section 6-6 of the Standard Specifications and City Special Provisions regarding compensation for delays.

7. INSURANCE.

- 7.1. **General**. The Contractor shall procure and maintain at its sole expense and throughout the term of this Agreement, any extension thereof, Commercial General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Workers' Compensation Insurance with such coverage limits as described herein.
- 7.2. Additional Insured Endorsements. The Contractor shall cause the insurance required by the Contract Document to include the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives as an additional insureds. For the Commercial General Liability coverage, said parties shall be named as additional insureds utilizing either:
 - Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Additional Insured endorsement CG 20 10 (11/85); or
 - 2. ISO Additional Insured endorsement CG 20 10 (10/01) and Additional Insured Completed Operations endorsement CG 20 37 (10/01); or
 - 3. Substitute endorsements providing equivalent coverage, approved by the City.

The endorsements shall be signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to such additional insureds. Coverage for such additional insureds does not extend to liability to the extent prohibited by Insurance Code Section 11580.4.

- 7.3. **Waivers of Subrogation**. All policies of insurance required by the Contract Documents shall include or be endorsed to provide a waiver by the insurers of any rights of recovery or subrogation that the insurers may have at any time against the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives.
- 7.4. **Primary Coverage**. All policies and endorsements shall stipulate that the Contractor's (and the Subcontractors') insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives, and shall be excess of the Contractor's (and its Subcontractors') insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 7.5. Coverage Applies Separately to Each Insured and Additional Insured. Coverage shall state that the Contractor's (and its Subcontractors') insurance shall apply separately to each insured or additional insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability. Coverage shall apply to any claim or suit brought by an additional insured against a named insured or other insured.
- 7.6. **Self-Insurance**. Any self-insurance (including deductibles or self-insured retention in excess of \$50,000) in lieu of liability insurance must be declared by Contractor and approved by

the City in writing prior to execution of the Agreement. The City's approval of self-insurance, if any, is within the City's sole discretion and is subject to the following conditions:

- Contractor must, at all times during the term of the Agreement and for a period of at least one (1) year after completion of the Project, and any extension of the one-year correction guarantee period in accordance with Section 6-8.1 of the City Special Provisions, maintain and upon Owner's reasonable request provide evidence of:
 - (a) Contractor's "net worth" (defined as "total assets" [defined as all items of value owned by the Contractor including tangible items such as cash, land, personal property and equipment and intangible items such as copyrights and business goodwill]) minus total outside liabilities must be reflected in a financial statement for the prior fiscal year reflecting sufficient income and budget for Contractor to afford at least one loss in an amount equal to the amount of self-insurance;
 - (b) financial statements showing that Contractor has funds set aside/budgeted to finance the self-insured fund (i.e., Contractor has a program that fulfills functions that a primary insurer would fill; and
 - (c) A claims procedure that identifies how a claim is supposed to be tendered to reach the financing provided by the self-insured fund.
- 2. If at any time after such self-insurance has been approved Contractor fails to meet the financial thresholds or otherwise fails to comply with the provisions set forth in this Paragraph 7, at the option of the City:
 - (a) the Contractor shall immediately obtain and thereafter maintain the third party insurance required under this Paragraph 7 and otherwise on the terms required above; or
 - the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or
 - (c) The Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation, claim administration, and defense expenses.
- 7.7. **Insurer Financial Rating**. Insurance companies providing insurance hereunder shall be rated A:VII or better in Best's Insurance Rating Guide and shall be legally licensed and qualified to conduct insurance business in the State of California.
- 7.8. **Notices to City of Cancellation or Changes**. Each insurance policy described in this Paragraph 7 shall contain a provision or be endorsed to state that coverage will not be cancelled without **thirty (30) days**' prior written notice by certified or registered mail to the City (this obligation may be satisfied in the alternative by requiring such notice to be provided by Contractor's insurance broker and set forth on its Certificate of Insurance provided to the City), except that cancellation for non-payment of premium shall require (10) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail. If an insurance carrier cancels any policy or elects not to renew any policy required

to be maintained by Contractor pursuant to the Contract Documents, Contractor agrees to give written notice to the City at the address indicated on the first page of the Agreement. Contractor agrees to provide the same notice of cancellation and non-renewal to the City that is required by such policy(ies) to be provided to the First Named Insured under such policy(ies). Contractor shall provide confirmation that the required policies have been renewed not less than seven (7) days prior to the expiration of existing coverages and shall deliver renewal or replacement policies, certificates and endorsements to the City Clerk within fourteen (14) days of the expiration of existing coverages. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of any notice of cancellation or alteration of the policies, Contractor shall procure within five (5) days, other policies of insurance similar in all respects to the policy or policies to be cancelled or altered. Contractor shall furnish to the City Clerk copies of any endorsements that are subsequently issued amending coverage or limits within fourteen (14) days of the amendment.

7.9. **Commercial General Liability**. Coverage shall be written on an ISO Commercial General Liability "occurrence" form CG 00 01 (10/01 or later edition) or equivalent form approved by the City for coverage on an occurrence basis. The insurance shall cover liability, including, but not limited to, that arising from premises operations, stop gap liability, independent contractors, products-completed operations, personal injury, advertising injury, and liability assumed under an insured contract. The policy shall be endorsed to provide the Aggregate Per Project Endorsement ISO form CG 25 03 (11/85). Coverage shall contain no contractors' limitation or other endorsement limiting the scope of coverage for liability arising from pollution, explosion, collapse, or underground (x, c, u) property damage. Contractor shall provide Products/Completed Operations coverage to be maintained continuously for a minimum of **one (1) year** after Final Acceptance of the Work, and any extension of the one-year correction guarantee period in accordance with Section 6-8.1 of the City Special Provisions.

Contractor shall maintain Commercial General Liability insurance with the following minimum limits: \$1,000,000 per occurrence / \$2,000,000 aggregate / \$2,000,000 products-completed operations.

- 7.10. **Business Automobile Liability**. Coverage shall be written on ISO form CA 00 01 (12/93 or later edition) or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage for owned, hired, leased and non-owned vehicles, whether scheduled or not, with \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. If necessary, the policy shall be endorsed to provide contractual liability coverage.
- 7.11. **Workers' Compensation**. Contractor shall comply with the applicable sections of the California Labor Code concerning workers' compensation for injuries on the job. Compliance is accomplished in one of the following manners:
 - 1. Provide copy of permissive self-insurance certificate approved by the State of California; or
 - Secure and maintain in force a policy of workers' compensation insurance with statutory limits and Employer's Liability Insurance with a minimal limit of \$1,000,000 per accident; or
 - 3. Provide a "waiver" form certifying that no employees subject to the Labor Code's Workers' Compensation provision will be used in performance of this Contract.
- 7.12. **Subcontractors' Insurance**. The Contractor shall include all Subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each

Subcontractor. All coverages for Subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

8. BONDS. The Contractor shall furnish a satisfactory Performance Bond meeting all statutory requirements of the State of California on the form provided by the City. The bond shall be furnished as a guarantee of the faithful performance of the requirements of the Contact Documents as may be amended from time to time, including, but not limited to, liability for delays and damages (both direct and consequential) to the City and the City's Separate Contractors and consultants, warranties, guarantees, and indemnity obligations, in an amount that shall remain equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract Price.

The Contractor shall furnish a satisfactory Labor and Materials Payment Bond meeting all statutory requirements of the State of California on the form provided by the City in an amount that shall remain equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract Price to secure payment of all claims, demands, stop notices, or charges of the State of California, of material suppliers, mechanics, or laborers employed by the Contractor or by any Subcontractor, or any person, form, or entity eligible to file a stop notice with respect to the Work.

All bonds shall be executed by a California-admitted surety insurer. Bonds issued by a California-admitted surety insurer listed on the latest version of the U.S Department of Treasury Circular 570 shall be deemed accepted unless specifically rejected by the City. Bonds issued by sureties not listed in Treasury Circular 570 must be accompanied by all documents enumerated in California Code of Civil Procedure Section 995.660(a). The bonds shall bear the same date as the Contract. The attorney-in-fact who executes the required bonds on behalf of the surety shall affix thereto a certified and current copy of the power of attorney. In the event of changes that increase the Contract Price, the amount of each bond shall be deemed to increase and at all times remain equal to the Contract Price. The signatures shall be acknowledged by a notary public. Every bond must display the surety's bond number and incorporate the Contract for construction of the Work by reference. The terms of the bonds shall provide that the surety agrees that no change, extension of time, alteration, or modification of the Contract Documents or the Work to be performed thereunder shall in any way affect its obligations and shall waive notice of any such change, extension of time, alteration, or modification of the Contract Documents. The surety further agrees that it is obligated under the bonds to any successor, grantee, or assignee of the City.

Upon the request of any person or entity appearing to be a potential beneficiary of bonds covering payment of obligations arising under the Contract, the Contractor shall promptly furnish a copy of the bonds or shall authorize a copy to be furnished.

Should any bond become insufficient, or should any of the sureties, in the opinion of the City, become non-responsible or unacceptable, the Contractor shall, within ten (10) Calendar Days after receiving notice from the City, provide written documentation to the Satisfaction of the City that Contractor has secured new or additional sureties for the bonds; otherwise the Contractor shall be in default of the Contract. No further payments shall be deemed due or will be made under Contract until a new surety(ies) qualifies and is accepted by the City.

Contractor agrees that the Labor and Materials Payment Bond and Faithful Performance Bond attached to this Agreement are for reference purposes only, and shall not be considered a part of this Agreement. Contractor further agrees that said bonds are separate obligations of the Contractor and its surety, and that any attorney's fee provision contained in any payment bond or performance bond shall not apply to this Agreement. In the event there is any litigation between the

parties arising from the breach of this Agreement, each party will bear its own attorneys' fees in the litigation.

9. RECORDS. The Contractor and its Subcontractors shall maintain and keep books, payrolls, invoices of materials, and Project records current, and shall record all transactions pertaining to the Contract in accordance with generally acceptable accounting principles. Said books and records shall be made available to the City of Moreno Valley, Riverside County, the State of California, the Federal Government, and to any authorized representative thereof for purposes of audit and inspection at all reasonable times and places. All such books, payrolls, invoices of materials, and records shall be retained for at least three (3) years after Final Acceptance.

10. INDEMNIFICATION.

- 10.1. **General**. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor assumes liability for and agrees, at the Contractor's sole cost and expense, to promptly and fully indemnify, protect, hold harmless and defend (even if the allegations are false, fraudulent, or groundless), the City of Moreno Valley, its City Council, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and all of their respective officials, officers, directors, employees, commission members, representatives and agents ("Indemnitees"), from and against any and all claims, allegations, actions, suits, arbitrations, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, or other legal proceeds, causes of action, demands, costs, judgments, liens, stop notices, penalties, liabilities, damages, losses, anticipated losses of revenues, and expenses (including, but not limited to, any fees of accountants, attorneys, experts or other professionals, or investigation expenses), or losses of any kind or nature whatsoever, whether actual, threatened or alleged, arising out of, resulting from, or in any way (either directly or indirectly), related to the Work, the Project or any breach of the Contract by Contractor or any of its officers, agents, employees, Subcontractors, Sub-subcontractors, or any person performing any of the Work, pursuant to a direct or indirect contract with the Contractor ("Indemnity Claims"). Such Indemnity Claims include, but are not limited to, claims for:
 - A. Any activity on or use of the City's premises or facilities;
 - B. Any liability incurred due to Contractor acting outside the scope of its authority pursuant to the Contract, whether or not caused in part by an Indemnified Party:
 - C. The failure of Contractor or the Work to comply with any Applicable Law, permit or orders;
 - D. Any misrepresentation, misstatement or omission with respect to any statement made in the Contract Documents or any document furnished by the Contractor in connection therewith:
 - E. Any breach of any duty, obligation or requirement under the Contract Documents, including, but not limited to any breach of Contractor's warranties, representations or agreements set forth in the Contract Documents:
 - F. Any failure to coordinate the Work with City's Separate Contractors;
 - G. Any failure to provide notice to any party as required under the Contract Documents;
 - H. Any failure to act in such a manner as to protect the Project from loss, cost, expense or liability;
 - I. Bodily or personal injury, emotional injury, sickness or disease, or death at any time to any persons including without limitation employees of Contractor;

- J. Damage or injury to real property or personal property, equipment and materials (including, but without limitation, property under the care and custody of the Contractor or the City) sustained by any person or persons (including, but not limited to, companies, corporations, utility company or property owner, Contractor and its employees or agents, and members of the general public);
- K. Any liability imposed by Applicable Law including, but not limited to criminal or civil fines or penalties;
- L. Any dangerous, hazardous, unsafe or defective condition of, in or on the Site, of any nature whatsoever, which may exist by reason of any act, omission, neglect, or any use or occupation of the Site by Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors;
- M. Any operation conducted upon or any use or occupation of the Site by Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors under or pursuant to the provisions of the Contract or otherwise;
- N. Any acts, errors, omission or negligence of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors;
- O. Infringement of any patent rights, licenses, copyrights or intellectual property which may be brought against the Contractor or Owner arising out of Contractor's Work, for which the Contractor is responsible; and
- P. Any and all claims against the City seeking compensation for labor performed or materials used or furnished to be used in the Work or alleged to have been furnished on the Project, including all incidental or consequential damages resulting to the City from such claims.
- 10.2. **Effect of Indemnitees' Active Negligence**. Contractor's obligations to indemnify and hold the Indemnitees harmless **exclude** only such portion of any Indemnity Claim which is attributable to the active negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitee, provided such active negligence or willful misconduct is determined by agreement of the parties or by findings of a court of competent jurisdiction. In instances where an Indemnitee's active negligence accounts for only a percentage of the liability for the Indemnity Claim involved, the obligation of Contractor will be for that entire percentage of liability for the Indemnity Claim not attributable to the active negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitee(s). Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge or otherwise reduce any other right or obligation of indemnity which would otherwise exist as to any party or person described in this Paragraph 11. Subject to the limits set forth herein, the Contractor, at its own expense, shall satisfy any resulting judgment that may be rendered against any Indemnitee resulting from an Indemnity Claim. The Indemnitees shall be consulted with regard to any proposed settlement.
- 10.3. Independent Defense Obligation. The duty of the Contractor to indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees includes the separate and independent duty to defend the Indemnitees, which duty arises immediately upon receipt by Contractor of the tender of any Indemnity Claim from an Indemnitee. The Contractor's obligation to defend the Indemnitee(s) shall be at Contractor's sole expense, and not be excused because of the Contractor's inability to evaluate liability or because the Contractor evaluates liability and determines that the Contractor is not liable. This duty to defend shall apply whether or not an Indemnity Claim has merit or is meritless, or which involves claims or allegations that any or all of the Indemnitees were actively, passively, or concurrently negligent, or which otherwise asserts that the Indemnitees are responsible, in whole or in part, for any Indemnity Claim. The Contractor shall respond within thirty (30) Calendar Days to the tender of any Indemnity Claim for defense and/or indemnity by an Indemnitee, unless the Indemnitee agrees

in writing to an extension of this time. The defense provided to the Indemnitees by Contractor shall be by well qualified, adequately insured and experienced legal counsel acceptable to the City.

- 10.4. Intent of Parties Regarding Scope of Indemnity. It is the intent of the parties that the Contractor and its Subcontractors of all tiers shall provide the Indemnitees with the broadest defense and indemnity permitted by Applicable Law. In the event that any of the defense, indemnity or hold harmless provisions in the Contract Documents are found to be ambiguous, or in conflict with one another, it is the parties' intent that the broadest and most expansive interpretation in favor of providing defense and/or indemnity to the Indemnitees be given effect.
- 10.5. **Waiver of Indemnity Rights Against Indemnitees.** With respect to third party claims against the Contractor, to the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor waives any and all rights to any type of express or implied indemnity against the Indemnitees.
- 10.6. **Subcontractor Requirements.** In addition to the requirements set forth hereinabove, Contractor shall ensure, by written subcontract agreement, that each of Contractor's Subcontractors of every tier shall protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees with respect to Indemnity Claims arising out of, in connection with, or in any way related to each such Subcontractors' Work on the Project in the same manner in which Contractor is required to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Indemnitees harmless. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such defense and indemnity obligations from others as required herein, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible to the Indemnitees according to the terms of this Paragraph 11.
- 10.7. **No Limitation or Waiver of Rights.** Contractor's obligations under this Paragraph 11 are in addition to any other rights or remedies which the Indemnitees may have under the law or under the Contract Documents. Contractor's indemnification and defense obligations set forth in this Paragraph 11 are separate and independent from the insurance provisions set forth in the Contract Documents, and do not limit, in any way, the applicability, scope, or obligations set forth in such insurance provisions. The purchase of insurance by the Contractor with respect to the obligations required herein shall in no event be construed as fulfillment or discharge of such obligations. In any and all claims against the Indemnitees by any employee of the Contractor, any Subcontractor, any supplier of the Contractor or Subcontractors, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the obligations under this Paragraph 11 shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the Contractor or any Subcontractor or any supplier of either of them, under workers' or workmen's compensation acts, disability benefit acts or other employee benefit acts. Failure of the City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on the City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.
- 10.8. **Withholding to Secure Obligations.** In the event an Indemnity Claim arises prior to final payment to Contractor, the City may, in its sole discretion, reserve, retain or apply any monies due Contractor for the purpose of resolving such Indemnity Claims; provided, however, the City may release such funds if the Contractor provides the City with reasonable assurances of protection of the Indemnitees' interests. The City shall, in its sole discretion, determine whether such assurances are reasonable.
- 10.9. **Survival of Indemnity Obligations.** Contractor's obligations under this Paragraph 11 are binding on Contractor's and its Subcontractors' successors, heirs and assigns and shall survive the completion of the Work or termination of the Contractor's performance of the Work.

11. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS. The Parties bind themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns the covenants, agreements and obligations contained in the Contract Documents. The Contractor shall not, either voluntarily or by action of law, assign any right or obligation of the Contractor under the Contract Documents without prior written consent of the City.

This report recommends adoption of the Proposed Resolution approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 17-18), including the Administrative Budget, for the period of July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018.

As successor agency ("Successor Agency") to the Community Redevelopment Agency (RDA) of the City of Moreno Valley, the City is responsible for winding down the affairs of the former RDA including disposing of its assets, making payments and performing other obligations owed for Enforceable Obligations. The Recognized Obligation Payment Schedules certain applicable periods provide the details necessary for the City serving as the Successor Agency to fulfill the former RDA's legally binding and enforceable agreements as required by law.

This report was presented to the Finance Sub Committee for review on December 7, 2016.

DISCUSSION

ABX1 26 requires the Successor Agency to approve a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule ("ROPS") for each six-month period. The required content of the ROPS, set forth in Health and Safety Code Section 34177(I)(1), details all of the Successor Agency's legally binding and enforceable obligations, anticipated payments, and sources of payments. Recognized obligations include bonds, loans, judgments, settlements, any legally binding and enforceable agreements or contracts, and contracts and agreements for agency administration or operation. AB 1484 further clarifies certain matters associated with the dissolution of RDAs and addresses substantive issues related to administrative processes, affordable housing activities, and repayment of loans from communities, use of existing bond proceeds, and the disposition or retention Successor Agency assets.

In order to facilitate the wind down process, on behalf of the Successor Agency, the City Council has adopted the following Resolutions:

- Resolution No. 2012-13, adopted on February 28, 2012, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule for the period of January 1, 2012 through June 30, 2012.
- Resolution No. 2012-22, adopted on April 10, 2012, approving a Second Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule for the period of July 1, 2012 through December 31, 2012.
- Resolution No. 2012-71, adopted on August 28, 2012, approving a Third Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule for the period of January 1, 2013 through June 30, 2013.
- Resolution No. SA 2013-02, adopted on February 26, 2013, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 13-14 A) for the period of July 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013.
- Resolution No. SA 2013-09, adopted on September 24, 2013, approving a

Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 13-14 B) for the period of January 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014.

- Resolution No. SA 2014-01, adopted on February 25, 2014, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 14-15 A) for the period of July 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.
- Resolution No. SA 2014-02, adopted on September 23, 2014, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 14-15 B) for the period of January 1, 2015 through June 30, 2015.
- Resolution No. SA 2015-01, adopted on February 24, 2015, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 15-16 A) for the period of July 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.
- Resolution No. SA 2015-02, adopted on September 22, 2015, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 15-16 B) for the period of January 1, 2016 through June 30, 2016.
- Resolution No. SA 2016-01, adopted on January 19, 2016, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 16-17) for the period of July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017.
- Resolution No. SA 2016-02, adopted on September 6, 2016, approving a Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS 16-17 B) to amend the ROPS 16-17 for the period of July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017.

Once approved, the ROPS 17-18 will be submitted to the Successor Agency's oversight board ("Oversight Board") for review and approval. Upon approval by the Oversight Board, a copy of the approved ROPS will be transmitted to the County-Auditor Controller, the State Controller's Office, the State Department of Finance, and posted to the City's website.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Adopt the attached proposed resolution, which approves the Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule, including the administrative budget for the period of July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018 and authorizing the transmittal of said Schedules to the Oversight Board for review and approval. Staff recommends this alternative because it allows the City serving as the Successor Agency to make required debt service payments in accordance with the State legislation.
- Decline to adopt the attached proposed resolution which would not allow the City, serving as the Successor Agency, to maintain the operations, and fulfill debt obligations of the former RDA as required by law. Staff does not recommend this alternative.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule provides the details necessary for the City serving as the Successor Agency to fulfill the former RDA's legally binding and enforceable agreements. The ROPS 17-18 will serve as authorization to pay obligations listed during the noted period including allowable administrative costs of \$125,000.

With the dissolution of the former RDA, there are continued risks that the payment of certain agreements may not be approved by the California Department of Finance, which will impact the General Fund. When these costs can be considered a short-term loan from the City to the Successor Agency and thus considered an enforceable obligation of the Successor Agency, the City shall seek reimbursement as available.

NOTIFICATION

No public notice is required prior to the City Council taking action on this item. However, the agenda for the meeting during which this item may be considered has been posted in the three locations that have been designated for the posting of City Council agendas.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley agreed to serve as successor agency to the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley ("Former RDA") commencing upon dissolution of the Former RDA on February 1, 2012 pursuant to Assembly Bill x1 26, as amended by AB 1484; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 34177(I), before each six-month fiscal period, the successor agency to a dissolved redevelopment agency such as the Former RDA is required to adopt a draft Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule ("ROPS") that lists all of the obligations that are "enforceable obligations" within the meaning of Health and Safety Code Section 34171, and which identifies a source of payment for each such obligation from among (i) the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund; (ii) bond proceeds; (iii) reserve balances; (iv) the administrative cost allowance; (v) revenues from rents, concessions, interest earnings, and asset sales; and (vi) the Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund established by the County Auditor-Controller to the extent no other source of funding is available or payment from property tax is contractually or statutorily required; and

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley ("City"), acting as the successor agency to the Former RDA ("Successor Agency") has prepared a ROPS and an administrative budget covering the period July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018 ("ROPS 17-18"); and

WHEREAS, the draft ROPS must be concurrently submitted to the County Administrative Officer, the County Auditor-Controller, the State Department of Finance, and the Successor Agency's oversight board ("Oversight Board").

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, SERVING AS THE SUCCESSOR AGENCY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. RECITALS

That the foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference, and constitute a material part of this resolution.

SECTION 2. APPROVAL OF ROPS 17-18 AND ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET

That the City Council acting on behalf of the Successor Agency hereby approve and adopt ROPS 17-18 and the related administrative budget, in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

SECTION 3. TRANSMITTAL

That City staff, acting for the Successor Agency, is directed to transmit the ROPS 17-18 to the Oversight Board, County Administrative Officer, the County Auditor-Controller, and the State Department of Finance.

Section 4. OTHER ACTS

That the City Manager, acting for the Successor Agency, or his/her designee is hereby authorized to make minor modifications to the ROPS 17-18, and each officer of the City, acting for the Successor Agency, is hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to execute and deliver such documents and instruments and to do such things which may be necessary or proper to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution, and any such actions previously taken by such officers are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed. Such acts shall include, but shall not be limited to, reformatting of the ROPS 17-18 as may be required by the Department of Finance.

Section 5. SEVERABILITY

That if any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Resolution which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Resolution are severable. The City Council acting for the Successor Agency hereby declares that it would have adopted this Resolution irrespective of the invalidity of any particular portion thereof.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Authorize the City Manager to submit a grant application in the amount of \$ 1,446,750 to the California Department of Education for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program to provide additional funding for after-school and summer programs at thirty elementary and middle schools in Moreno Valley.

SUMMARY

This grant funding, in partnership with THINK Together, MVUSD and VVUSD, would allow the City to extend the current after-school program for an additional 280 students. Additionally, the grant funding would allow the City to introduce a summer program for 3,740 elementary and middle school students. The grant application is in the amount of \$1,446,750 for which it is anticipated the Department of Education will announce the award of grants in April 2017.

BACKGROUND

ID#2352 Page 1

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) Program was originally created in 1994 under the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) and amended with the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. This program was reauthorized for FY 2016/17 under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

The State is responsible for providing the funding and monitoring the program outcomes. Program funding is used for the developing community learning centers which are established by public schools, consortia of schools, community-based organizations (CBO's), and/or private schools, with the assistance of community partners. In summary, the community learning centers provide disadvantaged students with academic support and educational enrichment opportunities to ensure they meet the state's academic achievement standards.

The City of Moreno Valley originally created an after-school program which operates during the regular school year with a state-funded After School Education and Safety (ASES) Grant awarded in fiscal year 2006/07. The grant has been renewed multiple times for which it is currently funded through FY 2018/19. The after-school program currently serves 3,751 students in kindergarten through eighth grades at 43 school sites in the Moreno Valley (MVUSD) and Val Verde (VVUSD) Unified School Districts; students are extended learning opportunities in a physically and emotionally safe environment. Since FY 2011/12, the City successfully partnered with THINK Together to staff and operate the after-school program at the 43 sites.

The City through this grant intends to expand the existing after-school program. The City's current and long-term partnership with THINK Together, MVUSD, and VVUSD is an ideal and timely situation to apply for additional grant funding through the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program.

DISCUSSION

The California Department of Education request for applications for 21st Century Community Learning Center Programs is available for FY 2017/18. This is a federally funded grant which provides for three basic programs: Before School Programs, After School Programs, and Summer Programs. The core grants provide funding for basic before and after school services; however, the funding for summer is intended to cover program services during the vacation, weekends, intercession periods, and other out-of-school times.

The City of Moreno Valley's application requests grant funding for a combination of After School Program and Summer Program. There are nineteen (19) schools in the Moreno Valley Unified School District, and eleven (11) schools in the Val Verde Unified School District which are currently in the Program Improvement status, giving them an additional priority point for funding consideration.

The thirty (30) sites are eligible for the Summer Program funding of approximately \$1,068,750, and seven (7) of those sites are also eligible for an additional amount of \$378,000 funding to expand the current school year program. The additional funding

would serve 40 additional students at seven (7) sites who are on a waiting list; the new Summer Program will serve approximately 118 students at the 30 sites. The grant application is for a total of \$ 1,446,750 for FY 2017/18. Successful grant applicants will receive a five-year award which will be allocated in annual increments. The applications are due December 2016, and the State will announce the award of grants in April 2017.

ALTERNATIVES

- Authorize the City Manager to submit a grant application to the California Department of Education for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program for elementary and middle school funding for fiscal year 2017/18. This option would allow the City to expand the current after school program by serving more students and adding a summer program.
- Do not authorize the City Manager to submit a grant application to the California Department of Education for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program for elementary and middle school funding for fiscal year 2017/18.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The expanded after school program addresses the Youth Programs priority by including a healthy lifestyles and fitness component, as well as organized sports activities at the middle school level:

Objective 6.2: Improve health, wellness and fitness for Moreno Valley youth through recreation and sports programs.

Initiative 6.2.1: Identify new trends and best practices of health and fitness recreation and athletic programs for youth between the ages of 7-12 years.

FISCAL IMPACT

Staff is recommending an application in the amount of \$1,446,750 for 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Funds for FY 2017/18. The proposed grant would fund all program expenditures at 100 percent through direct grant funding for the next five years. **Grant funds would be restricted to the after school program as designated in the application.** There is no impact to the General Fund. THINK Together would provide cash or in-kind local funds for the amount of any match requirement as determined by the award contract. Upon award, funding would be budgeted in the Fund 2202 Operating Budget.

TITLE: CONSIDERATION OF METHOD TO FILL THE VACANCY

IN DISTRICT 4 CREATED BY THE ELECTION OF MAYOR GUTIERREZ TO SERVE AS THE FIRST ELECTED

MAYOR FOR THE CITY

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

1. Consider the method by which it desires to fill the vacancy (appointment or special election) in District 4 and direct staff accordingly.

SUMMARY

This report recommends that Council directs staff to initiate the process which, by February 3, 2017, allows the Council to fill the vacancy in District 4 by an appointment. This will result in a positive fiscal impact for the City and will constitute the full Council much quicker than an election process.

DISCUSSION

Mayor Gutierrez's election as the City's first directly elected Mayor, leaves a vacancy in the District 4 seat for the remainder of his term (2 years). Under State law Council has two methods by which to fill the vacancy: i) an appointment by the Council to occur within 60 days of the vacancy being created, or ii) calling for an election and allowing the voters to elect a candidate for the remainder of the term. In either instance the qualified candidates would need to come from the boundaries of the old District 4, the one that elected then Council Member Gutierrez in 2014 election.

Under Government Code Section 36512(b) Council has 60 days to either fill the vacancy by appointment or call for a special election. The election needs to take place at the next regularly established election date (Gov. Code Section 36512(b) (1), not less

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than 114 days from the date the Council calls for such election. The County will have a consolidated election in June of 2017 and the ballot could include election for District 4 seat.

Whether appointed or elected at a special election, the successful candidate would hold the office till the end of term and the new District 4 residents would vote for the next Council Member in the November 2018 general election.

Staff recommends that Council fill the vacancy through an appointment process. Such process will result in having a full City Council seated much sooner, than if election was needed to fill the position. In addition substantial savings would be realized by the General Fund if the City does not need to pay the costs of the consolidated election. (see below).

As far as the appointment process, Council can direct staff to advertise and distribute a Notice of Vacancy, along with an application, map of the old District 4 boundaries and a letter setting out the process and timelines. Council could also invite potential candidates to contact Council members directly and be referred to the City Clerk's office for the application forms and verification of eligibility.

Depending on how much time Council wishes to provide the candidates to apply, the process could result in Council interviews (open session) and appointment as early as December 20th meeting, and certainly at either of the January regular Council meetings.

ALTERNATIVES

City Council has the following alternatives to consider:

- 1. Direct staff to initiate a process which would enable the Council to fill the vacancy by appointment prior to February 3rd, 2017. For reasons stated above, staff recommends this alternative.
- 2. Direct staff to initiate a process of calling for a special election to take place on June 6th, 2017. For reasons stated above this alternative is not recommended by staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

An appointment process would have minimal fiscal impact, limited to staff time in processing the applications and preparing Council agenda items for interviews and appointment.

City Clerk received an estimate from the County Registrar's office in the amount of \$80,000 to \$90,000, for including District 4 in the June consolidated election. This

amount would be a direct impact to the City's general fund.
